

**AMENDMENT TO H.R. 4641, AS REPORTED
OFFERED BY MR. COURTNEY OF CONNECTICUT**

At the end of the bill, add the following:

1 **SEC. 2. SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS TO ADDRESS**
2 **THE HEROIN AND OPIOID DRUG ABUSE EPI-**
3 **DEMIC.**

4 The following sums are appropriated, out of any
5 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
6 fiscal year ending September 30, 2016, and for other pur-
7 poses, namely:

8 DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE
9 OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS
10 STATE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE

11 For an additional amount for “State and local law
12 enforcement assistance”, for the Edward Byrne Memorial
13 Justice Assistance Grant program as authorized by sub-
14 part 1 of part E of title I of the Omnibus Crime Control
15 and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (except that section 1001(c),
16 and the special rules for Puerto Rico under section 505(g)
17 of title I of such Act shall not apply for purposes of this
18 Act) for expenses relating to drug treatment and enforce-
19 ment programs, law enforcement programing, and drug
20 addiction prevention and education programs,

1 \$200,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
2 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
3 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
4 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
5 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

7 COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING SERVICES PROGRAMS

8 For an additional amount for “Community Oriented
9 Policing Services Programs” for competitive grants to
10 State law enforcement agencies in States with high rates
11 of primary treatment admissions for heroin or other
12 opioids, \$10,000,000, to remain available until expended:
13 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
14 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
15 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
16 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

21 SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT

22 For an additional amount for “Substance Abuse
23 Treatment”, \$240,000,000, to remain available until ex-
24 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
25 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-

1 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
2 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C.
3 901(b)(2)(A)(i)): *Provided further*, That of the amount
4 provided—

5 (1) \$225,000,000 is for the Substance Abuse
6 Prevention and Treatment block grant program
7 under subpart II of part B of title XIX of the Public
8 Health Service Act;

9 (2) \$10,000,000 is for the Medication Assisted
10 Treatment for Prescription Drug and Opioid Addic-
11 tion program of the Programs of Regional and Na-
12 tional Significance within the Center for Substance
13 Abuse Treatment; and

14 (3) \$5,000,000 is for the Recovery Community
15 Services program of the Programs of Regional and
16 National Significance within the Center for Sub-
17 stance Abuse Treatment.

18 SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION

19 For an additional amount for “Substance Abuse Pre-
20 vention”, \$20,000,000 for the Strategic Prevention
21 Framework/Partnership for Success Strategic Prevention
22 Framework Rx of the Programs of Regional and National
23 Significance within the Center for Substance Abuse Pre-
24 vention, to remain available until expended: *Provided*,
25 That such amount is designated by the Congress as an

1 emergency requirement pursuant to section
2 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
3 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

4 MENTAL HEALTH

5 For an additional amount for “Mental Health” for
6 the Project AWARE program of the Programs of Regional
7 and National Significance within the Center for Mental
8 Health Services, \$5,000,000, to remain available until ex-
9 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
10 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
11 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
12 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C.
13 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

14 CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION

15 INJURY PREVENTION AND CONTROL

16 For an additional amount for “Injury Prevention and
17 Control” for expanding State-level prescription drug abuse
18 prevention efforts such as improving prescription drug
19 monitoring programs, data collection, and collaboration
20 among States, \$50,000,000, to remain available until ex-
21 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
22 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
23 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
24 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C.
25 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

1 NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH

2 NATIONAL INSTITUTE ON DRUG ABUSE

3 For an additional amount for the “National Institute
4 on Drug Abuse” for carrying out section 301 and title IV
5 of the Public Health Service Act with respect to drug
6 abuse, \$30,000,000, to remain available until expended:
7 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
8 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
9 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
10 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

11 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

12 PUBLIC HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES EMERGENCY

13 FUND

14 For an additional amount for the “Public Health and
15 Social Services Emergency Fund” to better coordinate and
16 respond to the national heroin and opioid drug abuse crisis
17 at the discretion of the Secretary of Health and Human
18 Services, \$40,000,000, to remain available until expended:
19 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
20 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
21 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
22 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).
