## AMENDMENT TO H.R. 4641, AS REPORTED OFFERED BY M<sub>S</sub>. Clark

At the end of the bill, add the following:

1	SEC. 2. SUPPORT FOR STATE RESPONSE TO SUBSTANCE
2	ABUSE PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS AND URGENT
3	MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS.
4	(a) In General.—There are authorized to be appro-
5	priated, and are appropriated, out of monies in the Treas-
6	ury not otherwise obligated, \$750,000,000 for each of fis-
7	cal years 2017 and 2018, to the Secretary of Health and
8	Human Services (referred to in this section as the "Sec-
9	retary") to award grants to States to address the sub-
10	stance abuse public health crisis or to respond to urgent
11	mental health needs within the State. In awarding grants
12	under this section, the Secretary may give preference to
13	States with an incidence or prevalence of substance use
14	disorders that is substantial relative to other States or to
15	States that identify mental health needs within their com-
16	munities that are urgent relative to such needs of other
17	States. Funds appropriated under this subsection shall re-
18	main available until expended.

1	(b) USE OF FUNDS.—Grants awarded to a State
2	under subsection (a) shall be used for one or more of the
3	following public health-related activities:
4	(1) Improving State prescription drug moni-
5	toring programs.
6	(2) Implementing prevention activities, and
7	evaluating such activities to identify effective strate-
8	gies to prevent substance abuse.
9	(3) Training for health care practitioners, such
10	as best practices for prescribing opioids, pain man-
11	agement, recognizing potential cases of substance
12	abuse, referral of patients to treatment programs,
13	and overdose prevention.
14	(4) Supporting access to health care services
15	provided by federally certified opioid treatment pro-
16	grams or other appropriate health care providers to
17	treat substance use disorders or mental health
18	needs.
19	(5) Other public health-related activities, as the
20	State determines appropriate, related to addressing
21	the substance abuse public health crisis or respond-
22	ing to urgent mental health needs within the State.
