AMENDMENT TO

RULES COMMITTEE PRINT 118–10 OFFERED BY MR. CUELLAR OF TEXAS

At the end of subtitle E of title XII, insert the following new section:

1	SEC. 12 GREAT POWER COMPETITION IN THE WESTERN
2	HEMISPHERE ADVISORY COMMISSION.
3	(a) Establishment.—There is established in the
4	legislative branch a Great Power Competition in the West-
5	ern Hemisphere Advisory Commission (in this section re-
6	ferred to as the "Commission").
7	(b) Duties of Commission.—The Commission
8	shall—
9	(1) review global great power competition, both
10	historical and current;
11	(2) review the progress of any studies, assess-
12	ments, or other reports relating to great power com-
13	petition in the Western Hemisphere conducted by or
14	on behalf of the Secretary of Defense, including pur-
15	suant to a statutory requirement;
16	(3) develop and review legislative proposals with
17	respect to great power competition in the Western
18	Hemisphere;

1	(4) monitor the progress of administrative poli-
2	cies of the Federal Government relating to great
3	power competition in the Western Hemisphere;
4	(5) review the allocation of Federal civilian em-
5	ployees and members of the Armed Forces regarding
6	great power competition in the Western Hemisphere;
7	(6) review the results of Federal interagency co-
8	operative efforts regarding great power competition
9	in the Western Hemisphere; and
10	(7) evaluate and make recommendations to the
11	President and Congress regarding—
12	(A) the effectiveness of existing Federal
13	policies regarding great power competition in
14	the Western Hemisphere;
15	(B) the allocation of the personnel referred
16	to in paragraph (5) to geographic combatant
17	commands, interagency task forces, or other
18	Federal departments or agencies, to address
19	great power competition in the Western Hemi-
20	sphere; and
21	(C) proposals for policies, legislation, and
22	funding to address great power competition in
23	the Western Hemisphere.
24	(c) Membership.—

1	(1) Appointment.—The Commission shall be
2	composed of 17 members appointed by the Chair-
3	man of the Committee on Armed Services of the
4	House of Representatives, in consultation with the
5	Ranking Member of such Committee, as follows:
6	(A) At least one member nominated by
7	each of the following:
8	(i) The Secretary of Commerce.
9	(ii) The Secretary of Defense.
10	(iii) The Secretary of Homeland Secu-
11	rity.
12	(iv) The Secretary of State.
13	(v) The Attorney General.
14	(B) At least one member employed by, or
15	assigned to, the Joint Interagency Task Force
16	South.
17	(C) At least one member employed by, or
18	assigned to, the Joint Task Force North.
19	(D) At least one member employed by, or
20	assigned to, the Defense Security Cooperation
21	Agency.
22	(E) Two members from among the staff of
23	the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House
24	of Representatives.

1	(F) Two members from among the staff of
2	the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Sen-
3	ate.
4	(G) Two members from among the staff of
5	the Committee on Armed Services of the House
6	of Representatives.
7	(H) Two members from among the staff of
8	the Committee on Armed Services of the Sen-
9	ate.
10	(2) Terms.—Each member shall be appointed
11	for the life of the Commission.
12	(3) Vacancies.—A vacancy in the Commission
13	shall be filled in the manner in which the original
14	appointment was made.
15	(4) Pay.—Members of the Commission may not
16	be compensated for their service on the Commission.
17	(5) Travel expenses.—Each member shall
18	receive travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of
19	subsistence, in accordance with applicable provisions
20	under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United
21	States Code.
22	(6) Chairperson.—The Chairperson of the
23	Commission shall be elected from among the mem-
24	bers of the Commission by majority vote.
25	(d) Powers of the Commission.—

1	(1) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commis-
2	sion may, for the purpose of carrying out this sec-
3	tion, hold hearings, sit and act at times and places,
4	take testimony, and receive evidence as the Commis-
5	sion considers appropriate. The Commission may ad-
6	minister oaths or affirmations to witnesses appear-
7	ing before it.
8	(2) Powers of members and agents.—Any
9	member or agent of the Commission may, if author-
10	ized by the Commission, take any action which the
11	Commission is authorized to take by this section.
12	(3) Obtaining official data.—Subject to the
13	Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. 552), the
14	Privacy Act (5 U.S.C. 552a), and any other relevant
15	provision of law relating to the protection of privacy,
16	and consistent with the protection of intelligence
17	sources and methods, the Commission may secure
18	directly from any department or agency of the
19	United States Government any information nec-
20	essary for the Commission to carry out its duties
21	under this section, and upon request of the Commis-
22	sion, the head of that department or agency shall
23	furnish such information to the Commission.
24	(4) Administrative support services.—
25	Upon the request of the Commission, the Adminis-

- 1 trator of General Services shall provide to the Com-
- 2 mission, on a reimbursable basis, the administrative
- 3 support services necessary for the Commission to
- 4 carry out its responsibilities under this Act.
- 5 (e) Report.—Not later than September 30, 2024,
- 6 the Commission shall submit to the Committees on Armed
- 7 Services of the House of Representatives and the Senate
- 8 a report on the findings of the Commission, including the
- 9 recommendations specified in subsection (b)(7).
- 10 (f) TERMINATION.—The Commission shall terminate
- 11 on September 30, 2024.
