AMENDMENT TO H.R. 273 OFFERED BY MS. EDWARDS OF MARYLAND

Page 2, after line 11, add the following:

1SEC. 2. STUDY TO ASSESS IMPACT OF CONTINUED ATTACKS2ON FEDERAL EMPLOYEES.

3 (a) CONGRESSIONAL FINDINGS.—Congress finds the4 following:

5 (1) Federal employees perform critical and 6 broad functions on behalf of the American people, 7 which include working on the front lines against ter-8 rorism, protecting our borders, safeguarding our 9 food and medicines, protecting consumers and re-10 storing confidence in our financial system, providing 11 health care to our veterans, and delivering many 12 other vital services to our Nation.

(2) Duties performed by the Federal workforce
require advanced skills, and, on average, Federal
workers are older, more experienced, and better educated than private-sector workers.

17 (3) Over the last several decades, the relative
18 size of the Federal Government has declined, even as
19 the population in the United States has increased.

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(4) Federal employees have been targeted in re cent deficit reduction efforts and have already con tributed \$103 billion over 10 years through pay
 freezes and increased retirement benefit contribu tions.

6 (5) Many Federal agencies have experienced
7 budget cuts, while their responsibilities and missions
8 have grown.

9 (6) According to the 2012 Federal Employee
10 Viewpoint Survey, overall morale and satisfaction
11 among Federal employees has decreased.

12 (7) Over time, continued attacks diminish the
13 Government's ability to recruit, hire, train, and re14 tain a talented and highly-skilled workforce, thereby
15 weakening the quality of our Federal civil service.

16 (b) STUDY.—Not later than 6 months after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General shall 17 transmit to the appropriate committees of Congress a re-18 19 port assessing the impact of continued attacks on Federal 20 employees, including pay freezes, increased pension con-21 tributions, and Federal budget cuts, in addition to, the 22 frequent threat of a Government shutdown through debt 23 ceiling negotiations, sequestration deadlines, and appro-24 priations lapses, on the capacity of the Government to3

2	experienced, and competent workforce to perform in-
3	herently governmental functions critical to serving

5	(2) maintain institutional knowledge, technical

12	(c) DEFINITION.—For purposes of this section, the

15	ment Reform of the House of Representatives; and
16	(2) the Committee on Homeland Security and
17	Governmental Affairs of the Senate.

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
