At the end of subtitle A of title VII, add the following:

1	SEC GAO REPORT ON TRUSTED TRAVELERS PRO-
2	GRAM.
3	(a) REPORT REQUIRED.—Not later than 1 year after
4	the date of enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General
5	of the Untied States, in collaboration with the Department
6	of Transportation and Department of Homeland Security,
7	shall submit to Committees on the House Transportation
8	and Infrastructure and Homeland Security of the House
9	of Representatives and the Committees on Commerce,
10	Science, Transportation and Homeland Security of the
11	Senate, a report on the Trusted Travelers Programs, to
12	include Global Entry, TSA PreCheck, NEXUS, and
13	SENTRI.
14	(b) Examination.—In developing the report under
15	subsection (a), the Comptroller general shall—
16	(1) evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of
17	the program's enrollment process, including the ap-
18	plication, vetting, and interview procedures;

1	(2) assess the timeline for processing applica-
2	tions, the consistency of background checks, and the
3	allocation of resources to ensure timely completion;
4	(3) review the security protocols in place for
5	vetting and approving applicants, considering their
6	effectiveness in identifying potential risks and ensur-
7	ing the integrity of the program;
8	(4) analyze the coordination between relevant
9	agencies, such as the United States Customs and
10	Border Protection and the Transportation Security
11	Administration, to promote a cohesive and robust se-
12	curity framework;
13	(5) assess the feasibility of expanding the
14	Trusted Travelers Program to include additional
15	trusted traveler initiatives, both domestically and
16	internationally;
17	(6) evaluate the potential benefits and chal-
18	lenges associated with the inclusion of new programs
19	or partnerships, and provide recommendations on
20	how to effectively manage such expansions;
21	(7) analyze the accessibility of the Trusted
22	Travelers Program, taking into account factors such
23	as geographic availability, cost, and eligibility cri-
24	teria;

1	(8) identify any disparities or barriers that may
2	prevent certain individuals or communities from ac-
3	cessing the program, and propose strategies to pro-
4	mote inclusivity and broaden participation;
5	(9) effectiveness of the Ombudsman Office and
6	accessibility to new and current applicants;
7	(10) examine the current policies regarding rev-
8	ocations; and
9	(11) evaluate the various methods of notice of
10	revocations, timeline for processing appeals, and re-
11	instatement.
