Add at the end of subtitle A of title XVII of division A the following:

1	SEC. 1703. PROHIBITION ON AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS FOR
2	PROCUREMENT OF CERTAIN BATTERIES.
3	(a) In General.—Beginning on October 1, 2027,
4	none of the funds authorized to be appropriated or other-
5	wise made available for the Department of Homeland Se-
6	curity may be obligated to procure a battery produced by
7	an entity specified in subsection (b).
8	(b) Entities Specified.—The entities specified in
9	this subsection are the following:
10	(1) Contemporary Amperex Technology Com-
11	pany, Limited (also known as "CATL").
12	(2) BYD Company, Limited.
13	(3) Envision Energy, Limited.
14	(4) EVE Energy Company, Limited.
15	(5) Gotion High tech Company, Limited.
16	(6) Hithium Energy Storage Technology com-
17	pany, Limited.
18	(7) Any entity on any list required under
19	clauses (i), (ii), (iv), or (v) of section 2(d)(2)(B) of

1	Public Law 117–78 (commonly referred to as the
2	"Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act").
3	(8) Any entity identified by the Secretary of
4	Defense as a Chinese military company pursuant to
5	section 1260H of the William M. (Mac) Thornberry
6	National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year
7	2021 (10 U.S.C. 113 note).
8	(9) Any entity included in Supplement No. 4 to
9	part 744 of title 15, Code of Federal Regulations, or
10	any successor regulation.
11	(10) Any subsidiary or successor to an entity
12	specified in paragraphs (1) through (9).
13	(c) Treatment of Production.—For purposes of
14	this section, a battery shall be treated as produced by an
15	entity specified in subsection (b) if such entity—
16	(1) assembles or manufactures the final product
17	that uses such battery; or
18	(2) creates or otherwise provides a majority of
19	the components used in such battery.
20	(d) Waivers.—
21	(1) Relating to assessment.—The Secretary
22	
	of Homeland Security may waive the prohibition
23	of Homeland Security may waive the prohibition under subsection (a) if the Secretary assesses in the

1	(A) The batteries to be procured do not
2	pose a national security, data, or infrastructure
3	risk to the United States.
4	(B) There is no available alternative to
5	procure batteries that are—
6	(i) of similar or better cost and qual-
7	ity; and
8	(ii) produced by an entity not speci-
9	fied in subsection (b).
10	(2) Relating to research.—The Secretary
11	of Homeland Security may waive the prohibition
12	under subsection (a) if the Secretary determines
13	that the batteries to be procured are for the sole
14	purpose of research, evaluation, training, testing, or
15	analysis.
16	(3) Congressional notification.—Not later
17	than 15 days after granting a waiver under this sub-
18	section, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall
19	submit to the Committee on Homeland Security of
20	the House of Representatives and the Committee on
21	Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the
22	Senate a notification relating thereto.
23	(e) Report.—Not later than 180 days after the date
24	of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland
25	Security shall submit to the Committee on Homeland Se-

3	Senate a report on the anticipated impacts on mission and

15	(6) The Federal Protective Service.
16	(7) The Federal Emergency Management Agen-
17	cy.
18	(8) The Federal Law Enforcement Training
19	Centers.
20	(9) The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Secu-
21	rity Agency.
