AMENDMENT TO RULES COMMITTEE PRINT 117– 54

OFFERED BY MR. KATKO OF NEW YORK

At the end of title LIII of division E of the bill, add the following:

1 SEC. 5306. PRELIMINARY DAMAGE ASSESSMENT.

2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

3 (1) Preliminary damage assessments play a
4 critical role in assessing and validating the impact
5 and magnitude of a disaster.

6 (2) Through the preliminary damage assess-7 ment process, representatives from the Federal 8 Emergency Management Agency validate informa-9 tion gathered by State and local officials that serves 10 as the basis for disaster assistance requests.

(3) Various factors can impact the duration of
a preliminary damage assessment and the corresponding submission of a major disaster request,
however, the average time between when a disaster
occurs, and the submission of a corresponding disaster request has been found to be approximately
twenty days longer for flooding disasters.

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1 (4) With communities across the country facing 2 increased instances of catastrophic flooding and 3 other extreme weather events, accurate and efficient 4 preliminary damage assessments have become criti-5 cally important to the relief process for impacted 6 States and municipalities. 7 (b) REPORT TO CONGRESS.— 8 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after 9 the date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator 10 of the Federal Emergency Management Agency shall 11 submit to Congress a report describing the prelimi-12 nary damage assessment process, as supported by 13 the Federal Emergency Management Agency in the 14 5 years before the date of enactment of this Act. 15 (2) CONTENTS.—The report described in para-16 graph (1) shall contain the following: 17 (A) The process of the Federal Emergency 18 Management Agency for deploying personnel to 19 support preliminary damage assessments. 20 (B) The number of Agency staff partici-21 pating on disaster assessment teams. 22 (C) The training and experience of such 23 staff described in subparagraph (B).

24 (D) A calculation of the average amount of25 time disaster assessment teams described in

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subparagraph (A) are deployed to a disaster area.

3 (E) The efforts of the Agency to maintain
4 a consistent liaison between the Agency and
5 State, local, tribal, and territorial officials with6 in a disaster area.

7 (c) Preliminary Damage Assessment.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 6 months 9 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Adminis-10 trator of the Federal Emergency Management Agen-11 cy shall convene an advisory panel consisting of 12 management personnel employed by emergency 13 State, local, territorial, or tribal authorities, and the 14 representative organizations of such personnel to as-15 sist the Agency in improving critical components of 16 the preliminary damage assessment process.

17 (2) MEMBERSHIP.—

18 (A) IN GENERAL.—This advisory panel 19 shall consist of at least 2 representatives from 20 national emergency management organizations 21 and at least 1 representative from each of the 22 10 regions of the Federal Emergency Manage-23 ment Agency, selected from emergency manage-24 ment personnel employed by State, local, terri-25 torial, or tribal authorities within each region. 4

1	(B) INCLUSION ON PANEL.—To the fur-
2	thest extent practicable, representation on the
3	advisory panel shall include emergency manage-
4	ment personnel from both rural and urban ju-
5	risdictions.
6	(3) CONSIDERATIONS.—The advisory panel con-
7	vened under paragraph (1) shall—
8	(A) consider—
9	(i) establishing a training regime to
10	ensure preliminary damage assessments
11	are conducted and reviewed under con-
12	sistent guidelines;
13	(ii) utilizing a common technological
14	platform to integrate data collected by
15	State and local governments with data col-
16	lected by the Agency; and
17	(iii) assessing instruction materials
18	provided by the Agency for omissions of
19	pertinent information or language that
20	conflicts with other statutory requirements;
21	and
22	(B) identify opportunities for streamlining
23	the consideration of preliminary damage assess-
24	ments by the Agency, including eliminating du-
25	plicative paperwork requirements and ensuring

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consistent communication and decision making among Agency staff.

3 (4) INTERIM REPORT.—Not later than 18 4 months after the date of enactment of this Act, the 5 Administrator shall submit to Congress a report re-6 garding the findings of the advisory panel, steps that 7 will be undertaken by the Agency to implement the 8 findings of the advisory panel, and additional legisla-9 tion that may be necessary to implement the find-10 ings of the advisory panel.

11 (5) RULEMAKING AND FINAL REPORT.—Not 12 later than 2 years after the date of enactment of 13 this Act, the Administrator shall issue such regula-14 tions as are necessary to implement the rec-15 ommendations of the advisory panel and submit to 16 Congress a report discussing—

17 (A) the implementation of recommenda-18 tions from the advisory panel;

(B) the identification of any additional
challenges to the preliminary damage assessment process, including whether specific disasters result in longer preliminary damage assessments; and

(C) any additional legislative recommenda tions necessary to improve the preliminary dam age assessment process.

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
