Amendment to the Rules Committee Print for H.R. 3053 Offered by Mr. Kildee of Michigan

At the end of title VI, add the following section:

1	SEC. 609. SENSE OF CONGRESS REGARDING WORKING
2	WITH THE CANADIAN GOVERNMENT TO PRE-
3	VENT A REPOSITORY FROM BEING BUILT
4	WITHIN THE GREAT LAKES BASIN.
5	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds as follows:
6	(1) The water resources of the Great Lakes
7	Basin are precious public natural resources, shared
8	by the Great Lakes States and the Canadian Prov-
9	inces.
10	(2) The United States and Canada have, since
11	1909, worked to maintain and improve the water
12	quality of the Great Lakes through water quality
13	agreements.
14	(3) Over 40,000,000 people in both Canada and
15	the United States depend on the fresh water from
16	the Great Lakes for drinking water.
17	(4) Ontario Power Generation is proposing to
18	build a permanent geological repository for nuclear

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1	waste less than one mile from Lake Huron in
2	Kincardine, Ontario, Canada.
3	(5) Nuclear waste is highly toxic and can take
4	tens of thousands of years to decompose to safe lev-
5	els.
6	(6) A spill of nuclear waste into the Great
7	Lakes could have lasting and severely adverse envi-
8	ronmental, health, and economic impacts on the
9	Great Lakes and the people that depend on them for
10	their livelihood.
11	(7) Over 187 local, county, State, and tribal
12	governments have passed resolutions in opposition to
13	Ontario Power Generation's proposed nuclear waste
14	repository.
15	(8) Tribes and First Nations' citizens have a
16	strong spiritual and cultural connection to the Great
17	Lakes and its protection is fundamental to treaty
18	rights.
19	(9) Ontario Power Generation has promised not
20	to move forward with their current proposal without
21	the support of the First Nations that would be im-
22	pacted.
23	(10) During the 1980s when the Department of
24	Energy, in accordance with the Nuclear Waste Pol-
25	icy Act of 1982, was studying potential sites for a

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permanent nuclear waste repository in the United
 States, the Canadian Government expressed concern
 with locating a permanent nuclear waste repository
 within shared water basins of the two countries.

5 (b) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con6 gress that—

7 (1) the Canadian Government should not allow
8 a permanent nuclear waste repository to be built
9 within the Great Lakes Basin;

10 (2) the President and the Secretary of State
11 should take appropriate action to work with the Ca12 nadian Government to prevent a permanent nuclear
13 waste repository from being built within the Great
14 Lakes Basin; and

(3) the President and the Secretary of State
should work together with their Canadian Government counterparts on a safe and responsible solution
for the long-term storage of nuclear waste.

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
