## AMENDMENT TO THE RULES COMMITTEE PRINT 117–54

## OFFERED BY MR. LYNCH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Add at the end of title LIV of division E the following:

## SEC. 5403. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

- 2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-3 ings:
- 4 (1) On September 11, 2012, the United States 5 consulate, and its personnel in Benghazi, Libya, 6 were attacked by militants.
- 7 (2) Four Americans were killed in the attack, 8 including Ambassador J. Christopher Stevens, Sean 9 Smith, Glen Doherty, and Tyrone Woods.
  - (3) Glen Doherty and Tyrone Woods were former Navy SEALs who served as security personnel in Libya. As the attack unfolded, they bravely attempted to defend American property and protect United States diplomatic personnel. In so doing, they selflessly sacrificed their own lives.
  - (4) Glen Doherty was a Navy SEAL for 12 years and served in Iraq and Afghanistan. He attained the rank of Petty Officer First Class and

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1	earned the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation
2	Medal. After leaving the Navy, Glen Doherty worked
3	with the Department of State to protect American
4	diplomats.
5	(5) Tyrone Woods served for 20 years as a
6	Navy SEAL including tours in Iraq and Afghani-
7	stan. In Iraq he led multiple raids and reconnais-
8	sance missions and earned the Bronze Star. After
9	retiring from the Navy as a Senior Chief Petty Offi-
10	cer, Tyrone Woods worked with the Department of
11	State to protect American diplomats.
12	(6) J. Christopher Stevens served for 21 years
13	in the U.S. Foreign Service. He was serving as U.S.
14	Ambassador to Libya and previously served twice in
15	the country, as both Special Representative to the
16	Libyan Transitional National Council and as the
17	Deputy Chief of Mission. Earlier in his life, he also
18	served as a Peace Corps volunteer teaching English
19	in Morocco.
20	(7) Sean Smith served for 6 years in the U.S.
21	Air Force. He attained the rank of Staff Sergeant
22	and was awarded the Air Force Commendation
23	Medal. After leaving the Air Force, Sean Smith
24	served for 10 years in the State Department on var-

1 ious assignments, which took him to places such as 2 Baghdad, Brussels, Pretoria, and The Hague. 3 (8) As their careers attest, all four men served 4 their country honorably. 5 (b) Congressional Gold Medal.— 6 (1) AWARD AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of the 7 House of Representatives and the President pro-8 tempore of the Senate shall make appropriate ar-9 rangements for the posthumous award, on behalf of 10 the Congress, of a single gold medal of appropriate 11 design collectively in commemoration of Glen 12 Doherty, Tyrone Woods, J. Christopher Stevens, and 13 Sean Smith, in recognition of their contributions to 14 the Nation. (2) Design and Striking.—For the purposes 15 16 of the award referred to in paragraph (1), the Sec-17 retary of the Treasury (hereafter in this section re-18 ferred to as the "Secretary") shall strike the gold 19 medal with suitable emblems, devices, and inscrip-20 tions, to be determined by the Secretary. The Sec-21 retary is authorized to create designs for the medal 22 that, if the Secretary deems it appropriate, include 23 images of, and inscriptions of the names of, Glen 24 Doherty, Tyrone Woods, J. Christopher Stevens, and 25 Sean Smith.

1	(3) Central intelligence agency mu-
2	SEUM.—
3	(A) In general.—Following the award of
4	the gold medal under paragraph (1), the gold
5	medal shall be given to the Central Intelligence
6	Agency Museum, where it shall be displayed as
7	appropriate and made available for research.
8	(B) Sense of congress.—It is the sense
9	of Congress that the Central Intelligence Agen-
10	cy Museum should make the gold medal re-
11	ceived under subparagraph (A) available for
12	display elsewhere, particularly at other appro-
13	priate locations associated with Glen Doherty,
14	Tyrone Woods, J. Christopher Stevens, and
15	Sean Smith.
16	(c) Duplicate Medals.—Under such regulations as
17	the Secretary may prescribe, the Secretary may strike and
18	sell duplicates in bronze of the gold medal struck under
19	subsection (b), at a price sufficient to cover the costs of
20	the medals, including labor, materials, dies, use of machin-
21	ery, and overhead expenses.
22	(d) National Medals.—Medals struck pursuant to
23	this section are national medals for purposes of chapter
24	51 of title 31, United States Code.
