Page 1714, after line 2, insert the following new section:

## 1 SEC. 60016. INVEST IN BUILDING RESILIENT COMMUNITIES 2 INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT PROGRAM.

3 (a) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this section is to es-4 tablish a program to provide funding to local community 5 entities to work together to build infrastructure, including services and skills training for individuals, that helps cre-6 7 ate a community that is safer, more secure, thriving, and livable, including helping build the resilience of and em-8 9 powering community residents, including those impacted 10 by trauma, violence, and stress.

(b) GRANTS.—The Secretary of Housing and Urban
Development, in conjunction with the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, shall make
grants to community-based organizations, including faithbased organizations and youth-serving organizations, that
are representative of a community or significant segments
of a community and which provides services to individuals
in the community.

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(c) ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES.—Funds from a grant
 under this section may be used only for the following ac tivities:

4 (1) To reduce or remove barriers to access and
5 lack of social services, health care, legal and political
6 representation, housing, employment, and education
7 opportunities in the local community.

8 (2) To support projects that will help promote9 community led economic development.

10 (3) To address the built environment, such as through building, renovating and/or revitalizing 11 12 shared community spaces such as parks, community 13 centers, schools, or housing in order to improve the 14 physical environment, address deterioration of com-15 munity assets, and create space for positive commu-16 nity interactions, including making investments in 17 public transportation to help better connect the com-18 munity to jobs, child care, education, health care, 19 and other services.

20 (4) To support community-based, participatory
21 approaches that promote community and youth en22 gagement, leadership development, improved govern23 ance, and capacity building.

24 (5) To provide training in trauma-informed ap-25 proaches to first responders, educators, clergy, and

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health and human services providers to increase
 their ability to assist children, adolescents, adults,
 and all community members, especially in the after math of civil unrest events.

(6) To provide community de-escalation train-5 6 ing and Mental Health First Aid, conflict mediation, 7 or other crisis intervention trainings, including for 8 school personnel, clergy, parents, community mem-9 bers, health and human services providers, and oth-10 ers as deemed appropriate by the Secretary of Hous-11 ing and Urban Development. Such training must in-12 clude increasing cultural competency and efforts to 13 reduce implicit bias that help heightened awareness 14 and acknowledgment of differences in language, age, 15 culture, socio-economic status, political and religious 16 beliefs, sexual orientation and gender identity, and 17 life experiences.

18 (7) To support the development and implemen-19 tation of a Community Needs and Resources Assess-20 ment that would gather and analyze current data 21 and information about the characteristics, needs, 22 and resources of the community in which the pro-23 posed activities will be implemented and shall involve 24 community members and focus on community-identi-25 fied drivers of poverty, trauma, and violence.

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(8) To support an outreach or education com ponent that seeks and solicits feedback from the
 local or regional community most directly affected by
 the proposed activities.

5 (d) PRIORITY.—Priority in making grants under this section shall be given to communities that either currently 6 7 or previously received a Resiliency in Communities After 8 Stress and Trauma (ReCAST) grant from the Substance 9 Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration of the 10 Department of Health and Human Services or that have been impacted by recent racial injustice demonstrations. 11 12 (e) ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS.—To be eligible for 13 a grant under this section, a community shall dem-14 onstrate—

(1) the existence of a community-coalition of
residents and non-profit organizations that would
provide leadership in overseeing the grant and implementation of the activities funded with grant
amounts;

20 (2) that the activities funded will include strong
21 partnerships with other key community stakeholders,
22 such as health and human services providers,
23 schools, institutions of higher education, faith-based
24 organizations, State and local government entities,

and employment, housing, and transportation serv ices agencies; and

3 (3) that the community will ensure that funded
4 activities are culturally competent and community
5 driven.

6 (f) FUNDING.—There is authorized to be appro7 priated to the Secretary of Housing and Urban Develop8 ment \$100,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2021 through
9 2025 for grants under this section.

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
