

AMENDMENT TO RULES COMM. PRINT 119–33

OFFERED BY MR. JONH MOOLENAAR OF MICHIGAN

In the appropriate place, add the following new section:

SEC. ____ . REPORT ON NATIONAL SECURITY RISKS OF FOREIGN ADVERSARY CONTROL OF UNITED STATES LAND NEAR MILITARY INSTALLATIONS.

(a) **REPORT REQUIRED.**— Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of War shall submit to the congressional defense committees a report on the national security risks of foreign adversary control of United States land near military installations and other critical infrastructure that supports the Department of War.

(b) **ELEMENTS.**—The report required under subsection (a) shall include the following:

(1) A list of any land transaction completed on or after December 9, 2024—

(A) in which an entity owned by, controlled by, or subject to the jurisdiction or direction of a foreign adversary gained control of United States land within 100 miles of a military installation or any other critical infrastructure location that supports the Department of War;

(B) that the Department of War concludes poses national security risks; and

(C) that was not covered under relevant laws or regulations at the time the transaction was completed.

(2) A list of any land transaction completed prior to December 9, 2024—

(A) in which an entity owned by, controlled by, or subject to the jurisdiction or direction of a foreign adversary gained control of United States land within 100 miles of a military installation or any other critical infrastructure location that supports the Department of War;

(B) as a result of which the land is currently controlled by an entity owned by, controlled by, or subject to the jurisdiction or direction of a foreign adversary;

(C) for which the Department of War concludes that the foreign adversary control of that land poses ongoing national security risks; and

(C) for which the relevant transaction was completed prior to December 9, 2024, and was not covered under relevant laws or regulations at that time.

(3) An assessment of whether there remain any gaps in relevant laws or regulations pertaining to foreign adversary control of United States land near military installations or other critical infrastructure locations that support the Department of War.

(4) An analysis of the risks to national security of any such gaps.

(5) A plan to close those gaps and address those national security risks.
