

AMENDMENT TO RULES COMM. PRINT 117-13
OFFERED BY MR. PHILLIPS OF MINNESOTA

At the end of title LX of division E, add the following:

1 **SEC. 6013. ANNUAL REPORT ON UNITED STATES POLICY**
2 **TOWARD SOUTH SUDAN.**

3 (a) REPORT REQUIRED.—Not later than 90 days
4 after the date of the enactment of this Act, and for five
5 years thereafter, the Secretary of State, in consultation
6 with the Administrator of the United States Agency for
7 International Development and the heads of other Federal
8 department and agencies as necessary, shall submit to the
9 appropriate congressional committees a report on United
10 States policy toward South Sudan, including the most re-
11 cent approved interagency strategy developed to address
12 political, security, and humanitarian issues prevalent in
13 the country since it gained independence from Sudan in
14 July 2011.

15 (b) ELEMENTS.—The report required by subsection
16 (a) shall include the following:

17 (1) An assessment of the situation in South
18 Sudan, including the role of South Sudanese govern-
19 ment officials in intercommunal violence, corruption,

1 and obstruction of peace processes, including the
2 credibility of internationally-supported peace pro-
3 cesses in the face of escalating violence and armed
4 conflict in South Sudan.

5 (2) An assessment of the 2018 the Revitalized
6 Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in the
7 Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS) and the ongo-
8 ing peace processes.

9 (3) A detailed outline and assessment of United
10 States assistance and other efforts to support peace
11 processes in South Sudan, including the efficacy of
12 stakeholder engagement and United States assist-
13 ance to advance peacebuilding, conflict mitigation,
14 and other related activities.

15 (4) An assessment of the United Nations Mis-
16 sion in South Sudan (UNMISS) over the last three
17 fiscal years.

18 (5) An analysis of the chronic food insecurity
19 issues in South Sudan, including identification of
20 root causes and ongoing or planned remediation ef-
21 forts.

22 (6) A detailed account of United States foreign
23 assistance to provide emergency and non-emergency
24 humanitarian and development assistance, improve
25 anti-corruption efforts, and create fiscal trans-

1 parenry in South Sudan over the last five fiscal
2 years.

3 (7) A breakdown of United States efforts, in-
4 cluding assistance provided by the Department of
5 the Treasury and United States law enforcement
6 and intelligence communities, to detect and deter
7 money laundering and counter illicit financial flows,
8 trafficking in persons, weapons, and other illicit
9 goods, and the financing of terrorists and armed
10 groups.

11 (8) A summary of United States efforts to pro-
12 mote accountability for serious human rights abuses
13 and an assessment of efforts by the Government of
14 South Sudan and the African Union, respectively, to
15 hold responsible parties accountable.

16 (9) Analysis of the impact of domestic and
17 international sanctions on improving governance,
18 mitigating and reducing conflict, combating corrup-
19 tion, and holding accountable those responsible for
20 human rights abuses.

21 (10) An assessment of the prospects for, and
22 impediments to, holding credible general elections.

23 (c) FORM.—The report required by subsection (a)
24 shall be submitted in unclassified form but may include
25 a classified annex.

1 (d) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES

2 DEFINED.—In this section, the term “appropriate con-
3 gressional committees” means—

4 (1) the Committee on Foreign Relations and
5 the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate; and

6 (2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the
7 Committee on Appropriations of the House of Rep-
8 resentatives.
