## AMENDMENT TO THE RULES COMMITTEE PRINT OF H.R. 702

## OFFERED BY MR. RUSH OF ILLINOIS

Page 4, after line 21, add the following:

1	SEC. 7. ENERGY-RELATED DIVERSITY SUPPLY CHAIN PRO-
2	GRAM.
3	(a) In General.—The Secretary of Energy (in this
4	section referred to as the "Secretary") shall establish and
5	carry out a comprehensive program via the Office of Eco-
6	nomic Impact and Diversity to increase the utilization and
7	inclusion of minority-owned businesses (in this section re-
8	ferred to as "MBEs") and women-owned businesses (in
9	this section referred to as "WBEs") in energy-related sup-
10	ply chain sectors, including by—
11	(1) collaborating with industry to identify the
12	services and activities needed within the energy sup-
13	ply chain, including obtaining data on the services
14	needed by sector and by region;
15	(2) collaborating with the Department of Com-
16	merce (Minority Business Development Agency), the
17	Small Business Administration, industry, the Na-
18	tional Minority Supplier Development Council (and
19	its regional affiliates), the Women's Business Enter-

1	prise Network Council, minority Chambers of Com-
2	merce chapters, and major certifying organizations
3	of minority- and women-owned businesses, to estab-
4	lish a public database on businesses that are both
5	certified as minority- or women-owned and are cur-
6	rent vendors in the oil and natural gas industry; and
7	(3) working with industry to establish pro-
8	grammatic commitments for diversity hiring for ven-
9	dor and contracting opportunities within the supply
10	chain through contractual obligations, incentives,
11	and other means as appropriate and necessary with
12	a goal of no less than 10 percent participation by
13	MBEs to be achieved by 2020.
14	(b) Diversity Supply Chain Specialty Centers
15	TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CENTERS.—The Secretary, in
16	collaboration with the Department of Commerce, industry,
17	the National Minority Supplier Development Council (and
18	its regional affiliates) the Women's Business Enterprise
19	Network Council, and other organizations determined nec-
20	essary by the Secretary, shall establish a minimum of five
21	regional centers or work with existing regional facilities
22	with the purpose of securing vendor and contracting op-
23	portunities for MBEs and WBEs within the energy sector.
24	The centers shall be placed in regions based on their geo-
25	graphic proximity and capacity to support energy-related

1	activities and services as part of the supply chain. The
2	Specialty Centers shall work with industry partners to
3	identify supply chain vendor and contracting opportunities
4	for MBEs and WBEs in energy-related sectors by—
5	(1) developing strategies for minority business
6	contracting and vendor opportunities, and to hold
7	business development sessions in strategic locations
8	where energy development exists or is expanding;
9	(2) holding regional training seminars to help
10	develop and prepare minority- and women-owned
11	firms to meet eligibility requirements for vendor and
12	contracting opportunities within the supply chain,
13	help these firms navigate the contracting process
14	with the larger oil companies, and secure contracts/
15	sub-contracts for these firms with oil companies and
16	prime contractors, and engaging industry partners
17	to ensure the events address specific needs in the
18	sector;
19	(3) encouraging the formation of consortiums/
20	partnerships by minority- and women-owned firms,
21	as well as with majority firms in order to meet
22	qualifications and capacities that industry is seeking;
23	(4) encouraging established contractors to team
24	up with minority- and women-owned firms in order

1	to help them become qualified and eligible to sign
2	contracts;
3	(5) holding business opportunity sessions with
4	chief procurement officers and seasoned minority
5	business executives in the energy sector to engage in
6	activities (such as panel discussions, plenary ses-
7	sions, and workshops to share best practices, current
8	trends and issues, and next practices) designed to
9	bolster the value that minority suppliers deliver to
10	corporate customers;
11	(6) holding small group capacity training ses-
12	sions, which may include more intensive MBE and
13	WBE capacity training for small groups of busi-
14	nesses seeking growth in the oil and gas sector. Also
15	include assessment tools to allow MBEs and WBEs
16	to conduct voluntary, objective self-assessments, and
17	subsequently provide technical assistance to address
18	operational gaps; and
19	(7) encouraging a "roundtable" task force of
20	the top 100 energy corporations to share successes.
21	best practices, and lessons learned to inform MBEs
22	and WBEs, and encourage industry commitments to
23	create supplier diversity goals.
24	(c) Access to Capital.—The Small Business Ad-
25	ministration shall provide funding for loans, financing

1	and insurance in order to assist minority- and women-
2	owned firms in securing contracts through mechanisms in-
3	cluding—
4	(1) public-private partnerships, including
5	matching fund (private sector match) per year for
6	programming in order to assist MBEs and WBEs in
7	securing contracts;
8	(2) minority-owned banks, including providing
9	funding for loans and financing in order to assist
10	energy sector supply chain minority- and women-
11	owned firms in securing contracts;
12	(3) solicit a coalition of investors focused on in-
13	vesting in MBEs and WBEs within the energy sec-
14	tor; and
15	(4) make grants available to Minority Serving
16	Institutions with formal engineering and entrepre-
17	neurship programs that could be used as recruiting
18	entities within the energy-related supply chain sec-
19	tor.
20	(d) Outreach to Minority Communities.—In
21	carrying out the program established under subsection (a),
22	the Secretary shall engage in education and outreach pro-
23	grams in order to bring awareness of vendor and con-
24	tracting opportunities to minority communities, including
25	by holding informational sessions at community events,

churches, Minority Serving Institutions (including historically black colleges and universities, predominantly black institutions, Hispanic-serving institutions, and tribal institutions), and other venues that the Secretary determines 4 5 necessary and appropriate. 6 (e) Report.— 7 (1) Publication of directory.—The Minor-8 ity Business Development Administration shall pub-9 lish a directory of 8a firms (as approved by the 10 Small Business Administration) that have North 11 American Industrial Codes (NAICs) in the energy 12 sector. It should be updated electronically on an on-13 going basis. Major energy companies shall be en-14 couraged to utilize this directory in recruiting 15 minority- and women-owned firms for contracting, 16 subcontracting, and partnerships such as Mentor/ 17 Protégé relationships. 18 (2) Use.—The Minority Business Development 19 Agency shall utilize the directory and other appro-20 priate resources in recruiting (outreach) firms for 21 technical support and lending assistance. 22 (3) SBA REPORTS.—The Small Business Ad-23 ministration shall submit quarterly reports on lend-24 ing activity to firms in the NAIC directory, as well 25 as on contracting activity of those same firms.

1	(4) Union trades reports.—The Depart-
2	ment of Labor shall send semi-annual reports on
3	union trades that deal in the energy sector per Exec-
4	utive Order 11246, including justification of the
5	unions' certification.
6	(f) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
7	are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary to carry
8	out this section \$15,000,000 for the fiscal years encom-
9	passing 2016 through 2025, to remain available until ex-
10	pended.
11	(g) Sunset.—The authority of the Secretary to carry
12	out this section shall expire at the end of fiscal year 2026.
