Add at the end of subtitle C of title XIII the following new section:

 1 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. SUSPENSION AND RESTRICTIONS OF SECURITY

 2 ASSISTANCE EXTENDED TO THE REPUBLIC

 3 OF HONDURAS UNLESS CERTAIN CONDI 

 4 TIONS ARE MET.

5 (a) SUSPENSION OF SECURITY ASSISTANCE.—No as6 sistance may be made available for the police or military
7 of the Republic of Honduras, including assistance for
8 equipment and training.

9 (b) LOANS FROM MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT
10 BANKS AND THE UNITED STATES INTERNATIONAL DE11 VELOPMENT FINANCE CORPORATION.—The Secretary of
12 the Treasury shall—

(1) instruct United States representatives at
multilateral development banks to use their voice
and vote to oppose any loans for the police or military of the Republic of Honduras; and

17 (2) instruct the United States Executive Direc-18 tor of each international financial institution and the

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Chief Executive Officer of the United States Inter-1 2 national Development Finance Corporation to promote human rights due diligence and risk manage-3 4 ment in connection with any loan, grant, policy, or 5 strategy related to the Republic of Honduras, in ac-6 cordance with the criteria specified in subsection 7 7029(d) of the Department of State, Foreign Oper-8 ations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 9 2020 (division G of Public Law 116–94; 133 Stat. 10 2863) and accompanying report.

(c) CONDITIONS FOR LIFTING SUSPENSIONS AND
RESTRICTIONS.—The provisions of this section shall terminate on the date on which the Secretary of State determines and reports to the Committees on Foreign Relations
and Appropriations of the Senate and the Committees on
Foreign Affairs and Appropriations of the House of Representatives that the Government of Honduras has—

6 (4) established that it protects effectively the 7 rights of trade unionists, journalists, small farmers, 8 human rights and environmental defenders, indige-9 nous and Afro-indigenous community members and 10 rights activists, women's and LGBTQI rights activ-11 ists, critics of the government, and other members of 12 civil society to operate without interference or re-13 pression; and

(5) taken effective steps to establish the rule of
law and to guarantee a judicial system that is capable of investigating, prosecuting, and bringing to justice members of the police and military who have
committed human rights abuses.

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
