Amendment to Rules Comm. Print 118–36 Offered by Mr. Schiff of California

At the end of subtitle C of title XVII, insert the following new section:

1	SEC. 17 SENSE OF CONGRESS ON AZERBAIJAN'S ILLE-
2	GAL DETENTION OF ARMENIAN PRISONERS
3	OF WAR.
4	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
5	(1) On September 27, 2020, Azerbaijan
6	launched a military assault on Artsakh (Nagorno-
7	Karabakh), resulting in thousands of deaths, the dis-
8	placement of tens of thousands of ethnic Armenian
9	residents, and the detention of more than 100 Arme-
10	nian prisoners of war by Azerbaijan.
11	(2) On November 9, 2020, Azerbaijan, Arme-
12	nia, and Russia signed a tripartite ceasefire state-
13	ment, in which all parties agreed that the "exchange
14	of prisoners of war, hostages and other detainees as
15	well as the remains of the fatalities shall be carried
16	out".
17	(3) The Third Geneva Convention, of which
18	Azerbaijan is a signatory, and customary inter-

18 Azerbaijan is a signatory, and customary inter-19 national law require the release of prisoners of war

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and captured civilians upon the cessation of hos tilities.

3 (4) Despite Azerbaijan's international legal obli4 gations, more than two years after signing the No5 vember 2020 statement, it has not released all rel6 evant persons and instead continues to detain new
7 prisoners of war, hostages, and captured civilians.

8 (5) In September 2022, Azerbaijan launched
9 another unprovoked assault on sovereign Armenian
10 territory, resulting in the deaths of at least 49 sol11 diers and additional prisoners of war taken hostage.

(6) In just one of the latest examples, on May
27, 2023, an Azerbaijani armed group crossed into
sovereign Armenian territory and abducted two Armenian soldiers delivering food in Syunik province,
who are now imprisoned by Azerbaijani authorities
and face unsubstantiated terrorism charges.

(7) At least 33 and up to 131 prisoners of war
are still detained, though the true number is unknown given the limited reliable information about
the condition or treatment of prisoners of war and
captured civilians in Azerbaijan and the government's misrepresentations of their status in an attempt to justify their continued captivity.

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1 (8) Azerbaijan is bound by the International 2 Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and the Eu-3 ropean Convention on Human Rights, to which it is 4 a party, as well as the Third Geneva Convention, to 5 custody humanely in those in all cirtreat 6 cumstances.

7 (9) Human Rights Watch reported in March 8 2021 that Azerbaijani forces had abused ethnic Ar-9 menian prisoners of war and subjected them to 10 "cruel and degrading treatment and torture either 11 when they were captured, during their transfer, or 12 while in custody at various detention facilities", in-13 cluding electrical shocks, prolonged and repeated 14 beatings, and prodding with sharp metal rods.

(10) A December 2021 International Court of
Justice ruling ordered Azerbaijan to protect from violence and bodily harm Armenians detained during
or since the 2020 fighting and provide for their security and equality before the law.

(11) A September 2022 United Nations Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination
report highlighted deep concern over "Allegations of
severe and grave human rights violations committed
during the 2020 hostilities and beyond by Azerbaijani military forces against prisoners of war and

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other protected persons of Armenian ethnic or na tional origin—including extrajudicial killings, torture
 and other ill-treatment and arbitrary detention.".

4 (12) A video authenticated by Human Rights
5 Watch showed the extrajudicial execution of at least
6 7 Armenian prisoners of war, apparently by Azer7 baijani forces in September 2022, "a war crime for
8 which there needs to be accountability".

9 (13) There is significant concern that female 10 detainees in particular could be subject to sexual as-11 saults and other mistreatment, with video footage 12 from September 2022 showing one horrific example 13 of a female Armenian soldier who was dismembered, 14 stripped, and mutilated by Azerbaijani troops.

(14) The Department of State's Human Rights
Reports released March 2023 document "credible reports of unlawful killings involving summary executions of Armenian soldiers in Azerbaijani custody"
and concerns regarding lack of due process in Azerbaijani trials of Armenian civilians and servicemen.

(15) Armenia has fulfilled its obligations under
the November 9 statement and international law by
returning Azerbaijani prisoners of war.

24 (16) Azerbaijan's continued detainment, tor25 ture, and extrajudicial execution of prisoners of war

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and captured civilians calls into serious question
 their commitment to human rights and negotiating
 an equitable, lasting peace settlement.

4 (17) The United States, along with France and
5 Russia, is a cochair of the Organization for Security
6 and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) Minsk Group
7 which was created to seek a durable and peaceful so8 lution to the conflict.

9 (18) In the context of ongoing peace talks in-10 volving Armenia, Azerbaijan, the United States, the 11 European Union, and Russia, there have been calls 12 for the release of prisoners of war as soon as pos-13 sible, and a decision by Azerbaijan to release all re-14 maining prisoners of war in its custody could rep-15 resent an important confidence-building measure.

16 (b) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con17 gress that—

(1) Azerbaijan must immediately return all Armenian prisoners of war and captured civilians, and
provide information on the whereabouts of servicemen and civilians who were last seen in Azerbaijani
custody but whose status is unknown;

23 (2) Azerbaijan must conduct prompt and trans24 parent investigations into allegations of torture,
25 extrajudicial killings, and other abuses against pris-

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oners of war and hold accountable those responsible;
 and

3 (3) the Biden administration should engage at
4 all levels with Azerbaijani authorities, including
5 through the OSCE Minsk Group process, to make
6 clear the importance of adhering to their obligations
7 under the November 9 statement and international
8 law to immediately release all prisoners of war and
9 captured civilians and treat them humanely.

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
