AMENDMENT TO RULES COMMITTEE PRINT 117-3 OFFERED BY MS. SPEIER OF CALIFORNIA

At the end of the bill, add the following:

1 SEC. ___. ONLINE SURVEY TOOL FOR CAMPUS SAFETY.

2	(a) In General.—The Secretary of Education shall,
3	in consultation with the Attorney General, Director of the
4	Centers for Disease Control, and the Secretary of the De-
5	partment of Health and Human Services and experts in
6	domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sexual
7	harassment, and stalking, develop, design, and make avail-
8	able through a secure and accessible online portal, a
9	standardized online survey tool regarding student experi-
10	ences with domestic violence, dating violence, sexual as-
11	sault, sexual harassment, and stalking.
12	(b) Development of Survey Tool.—In devel-
13	oping the survey tool required under subsection (a), the
14	Secretary of Education shall—
15	(1) use best practices from peer-reviewed re-
16	search measuring domestic violence, dating violence,
17	sexual assault, sexual harassment, and stalking;
18	(2) consult with the higher education commu-
19	nity, experts in survey research related to domestic
20	violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sexual har-

1	assment, and stalking, and organizations engaged in
2	the prevention of and response to, and advocacy on
3	behalf of victims of, domestic violence, dating vio-
4	lence, sexual assault, sexual harassment, and stalk-
5	ing regarding the development and design of such
6	survey tool and the methodology for administration
7	of such survey tool; and
8	(3) ensure that the survey tool is readily acces-
9	sible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.
10	(c) Elements.—
11	(1) In general.—The survey tool developed
12	pursuant to this paragraph shall be fair and unbi-
13	ased, scientifically valid and reliable, and meet the
14	highest standards of survey research.
15	(2) Survey questions.—Survey questions in-
16	cluded in the survey tool developed pursuant to this
17	section shall—
18	(A) be designed to gather information on
19	student experiences with domestic violence, dat-
20	ing violence, sexual assault, sexual harassment,
21	and stalking, including the experiences of vic-
22	tims of such incidents;
23	(B) use trauma-informed language to pre-
24	vent retraumatization; and
25	(C) include the following:

1	(i) Questions that give students the
2	option to report their demographic infor-
3	mation.
4	(ii) Questions designed to determine
5	the incidence and prevalence of domestic
6	violence, dating violence, sexual assault,
7	sexual harassment, and stalking.
8	(iii) Questions regarding whether stu-
9	dents know about institutional policies and
10	procedures related to domestic violence,
11	dating violence, sexual assault, sexual har-
12	assment, and stalking.
13	(iv) Questions designed to determine,
14	if victims reported domestic violence, dat-
15	ing violence, sexual assault, sexual harass-
16	ment, or stalking—
17	(I) to whom the incident was re-
18	ported and what response the victim
19	may have received;
20	(II) whether the victim was in-
21	formed of, or referred to, national,
22	State, local, or on-campus resources;
23	and
24	(III) whether the entity to whom
25	the victim reported the incident con-

1	ducted an investigation and the dura-
2	tion and final resolution of such an
3	investigation.
4	(v) Questions regarding contextual
5	factors, such as whether force, incapacita-
6	tion, or coercion was involved.
7	(vi) Questions to determine whether
8	an accused individual was a student at the
9	institution.
10	(vii) Questions to determine whether a
11	victim reported an incident to State, local,
12	or campus law enforcement.
13	(viii) Questions to determine why the
14	victim chose to report or not report an in-
15	cident to the institution or State, local, or
16	campus law enforcement.
17	(ix) Questions to determine the im-
18	pact of domestic violence, dating violence,
19	sexual assault, sexual harassment, and
20	stalking on the victim's education, includ-
21	ing diminished grades, dropped classes,
22	leaves of absence, and negative financial
23	consequences (such as costs associated
24	with loss in paid tuition due to leaves of
25	absence, loss in scholarship awards due to

1	diminished grades, and cost associated
2	with counseling, medical services, or hous-
3	ing changes).
4	(x) Questions to determine the impact
5	and effectiveness of prevention and aware-
6	ness programs and complaints processes.
7	(xi) Questions to determine attitudes
8	toward sexual violence and harassment, in-
9	cluding the willingness of individuals to in-
10	tervene as a bystander of sex-based (in-
11	cluding sexual orientation-based and gen-
12	der identity-based), race-based, national
13	origin-based, and disability-based discrimi-
14	nation, harassment, assault, domestic vio-
15	lence, dating violence, sexual assault, sex-
16	ual harassment, and stalking.
17	(xii) Other questions, as determined
18	by the Secretary of Education.
19	(3) Additional elements.—In addition to
20	the standardized questions developed by the Sec-
21	retary of Education under paragraph (2), an institu-
22	tion may request additional information from stu-
23	dents that would increase the understanding of the
24	institution of school climate factors unique to their
25	campuses.

1	(4) Responses.—The responses to the survey
2	questions described in paragraph (2) shall—
3	(A) be submitted confidentially;
4	(B) not be included in crime statistics; and
5	(C) in the case of such responses being in-
6	cluded in a report, shall not include personally
7	identifiable information.
8	(d) Administration of Survey.—
9	(1) FEDERAL ADMINISTRATION.—The Sec-
10	retary of Education, in consultation with the Attor-
11	ney General, Director of the Centers for Disease
12	Control, and Secretary of the Department of Health
13	and Human Services, shall develop a mechanism by
14	which institutions of higher education may, with re-
15	spect to the survey tool developed pursuant to this
16	section—
17	(A) administer such survey tool; and
18	(B) modify such survey tool to include ad-
19	ditional elements or requirements, as deter-
20	mined by the institution.
21	(2) Costs.—The Secretary of Education may
22	not require an institution of higher education to pay
23	to modify the survey tool in accordance with para-
24	graph (1)(B).

1	(3) Accessibility.—The Secretary of Edu-
2	cation shall ensure that the survey tool is adminis-
3	tered in such a way as to be readily accessible to
4	and usable by individuals with disabilities.
5	(4) Institutional administration.—Begin-
6	ning not later than one year after the date on which
7	the Secretary of Education makes available to insti-
8	tutions the mechanism described in paragraph (1),
9	and every 2 years thereafter, each institution shall
10	administer the survey tool developed pursuant to
11	this section.
12	(e) Completed Surveys.—The Secretary of Edu-
13	cation shall require each institution participating in any
14	program under this title to ensure, to the maximum extent
15	practicable, that an adequate, random, and representative
16	sample size of students (as determined by the Secretary)
17	enrolled at the institution complete the survey tool devel-
18	oped pursuant to this section.
19	(f) Report.—Beginning not later than 2 years after
20	the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Edu-
21	cation shall prepare a biennial report on the information
22	gained from the standardized elements of the survey under
23	this section and publish such report in an accessible for-
24	mat on the website of the Department and submit such
25	report to Congress. The report shall include campus-level

data for each school and attributed by name of each campus in a manner that permits comparisons across schools 3 and campuses. (g) Publication.—Each institution shall publish, in 4 5 a manner that is readily accessible and usable by individuals, including individuals with disabilities— 6 7 (1) the campus-level results of the standardized 8 elements of the survey under this section on the 9 website of the institution and in the annual security report required under subsection (f) for the cam-10 11 puses affiliated with the institution; and 12 (2) the campus-level results of the additional 13 elements modifying the survey by the institution, if 14 any, on the website of the institution. 15 (h) VIOLATION.—Upon a determination pursuant to section 487(c)(3)(B) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 16 17 (20 U.S.C. 1094(c)(3)(B)) that an institution of higher 18 education has violated or failed to carry out any provision 19 under this section, the Secretary of Education shall impose a civil penalty upon the institution in the same 21 amount and pursuant to the same procedures as a civil penalty is imposed under section 487(c)(3)(B) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1094(c)(3)(B)).
