## Amendment to Rules Comm. Print 118–36 Offered by Ms. Stevens of Michigan

Add at the end of subtitle C of title XVII the following:

 SEC. 1748. FOUNDATION FOR STANDARDS AND METROL 

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3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary, acting
4 through the Director, shall establish a nonprofit corpora5 tion to be known as the "Foundation for Standards and
6 Metrology".

7 (b) MISSION.—The mission of the Foundation shall8 be to—

9 (1) support the Institute in carrying out its ac-10 tivities and mission to advance measurement science, 11 technical standards, and technology in ways that en-12 hance the economic security and prosperity of the 13 United States; and

(2) advance collaboration with researchers, institutions of higher education, industry, and nonprofit and philanthropic organizations to accelerate
the development of technical standards, measurement science, and the commercialization of emerging
technologies in the United States.

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(c) ACTIVITIES.—In carrying out its mission under
 subsection (b), the Foundation may carry out the fol lowing:

4 (1) Support international metrology and tech5 nical standards engagement activities.

6 (2) Support studies, projects, and research on
7 metrology and the development of benchmarks and
8 technical standards infrastructure across the Insti9 tute's mission areas.

10 (3) Advance collaboration between the Institute 11 and researchers, industry, nonprofit and philan-12 thropic organizations, institutions of higher edu-13 cation, including historically Black colleges and uni-14 versities, EPSCoR Institutions, Tribal Colleges or 15 Universities, minority-serving institutions, federally 16 funded research and development centers, and State, 17 Tribal, and local governments.

(4) Support the expansion and improvement of
research facilities and infrastructure at the Institute
to advance the development of emerging technologies.

(5) Support the commercialization of federallyfunded research.

(6) Conduct education and outreach activities.

1 (7) Offer direct support to NIST associates, in-2 cluding through the provision of fellowships, grants, 3 stipends, travel, health insurance, professional devel-4 opment training, housing, technical and administrative assistance, recognition awards for outstanding 5 6 performance, and occupational safety and awareness 7 training and support, and other appropriate expendi-8 tures.

9 (8) Conduct such other activities as determined
10 necessary by the Foundation to carry out its mis11 sion.

(d) AUTHORITY OF THE FOUNDATION.—The Foun13 dation shall be the sole entity responsible for carrying out
14 the activities described in subsection (c).

15 (e) STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT.—The Foundation 16 shall convene, and may consult with, representatives from 17 the Institute, institutions of higher education, the private 18 sector, non-profit organizations, and commercialization or-19 ganizations to develop activities for the mission of the 20 Foundation under subsection (b) and to advance the ac-21 tivities of the Foundation under subsection (c).

(f) LIMITATION.—The Foundation shall not be anagency or instrumentality of the Federal Government.

24 (g) SUPPORT.—The Foundation may receive, admin-25 ister, solicit, accept, and use funds, gifts, devises, or be-

quests, either absolutely or in trust of real or personal 1 property or any income therefrom or other interest therein 2 to support activities under subsection (c). 3 4 (h) TAX EXEMPT STATUS.—The Board shall take all 5 necessary and appropriate steps to ensure the Foundation is an organization described in section 501(c) of the Inter-6 7 nal Revenue Code of 1986 and exempt from taxation 8 under section 501(a) of such Code. 9 (i) BOARD OF DIRECTORS.— (1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Foundation shall 10 11 be governed by a Board of Directors. 12 (2) Composition.— 13 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Board shall be 14 composed of the following: 15 (i) Appointed voting members de-16 scribed in subparagraph (B). 17 (ii) Ex officio nonvoting members de-18 scribed in subparagraph (C). 19 (B) Appointed members.— 20 MEMBERS.—The Sec-(i) INITIAL 21 retary, acting through the Director, shall— 22 (I) seek to enter into an agree-

to develop a list of individuals to serve

4	(II) appoint the initial members
5	of the Board from such list, if appli-
6	cable, in consultation with the Na-
7	tional Academies of Sciences, Engi-
8	neering, and Medicine.
9	(ii) Representation.—The ap-
10	pointed members of the Board shall reflect
11	a broad cross-section of stakeholders
12	across diverse sectors, regions and commu-
13	nities, including from academia, private
14	sector entities, technical standards bodies,
15	the investment community, the philan-
16	thropic community, and other nonprofit or-
17	ganizations.
18	(iii) EXPERIENCE.—The Secretary,
19	acting through the Director, shall ensure
20	the appointed members of the Board have
21	the experience and are qualified to provide
22	advice and information to advance the
23	Foundation's mission, including in science
24	and technology research and development,
25	technical standards, education, technology

1	transfer, commercialization, or other as-
2	pects of the Foundation's mission.
3	(C) Nonvoting members.—
4	(i) Ex officio members.—The ex
5	officio members of the Board shall be the
6	following individuals or the designees of
7	such individuals:
8	(I) The Director.
9	(II) The Associate Director for
10	Laboratory Programs.
11	(III) The Associate Director for
12	Innovation and Industry Services.
13	(IV) The Associate Director for
14	Management Resources.
15	(ii) NO VOTING POWER.—The ex offi-
16	cio members described in clause (i) shall
17	not have voting power on the Board.
18	(3) Chair and vice chair.—
19	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Board shall des-
20	ignate, from among its members—
21	(i) an individual to serve as the chair
22	of the Board; and
23	(ii) an individual to serve as the vice
24	chair of the Board.

1	(B) TERMS.—The term of service of the
2	Chair and Vice Chair of the Board shall end on
3	the earlier of—
4	(i) the date that is three years after
5	the date on which the Chair or Vice Chair
6	of the Board, as applicable, is designated
7	for the respective position; and
8	(ii) the last day of the term of service
9	of the member, as determined under para-

21	diately preceding Chair and Vice Chair of

23	(4) TERMS AND VACANCIES.—
24	(A) TERM LIMITS.—Subject to subpara-
25	graph (B), the term of office of each member

1 of the Board shall be not more than five years, 2 except that a member of the Board may continue to serve after the expiration of the term 3 4 of such member until the expiration of the 180day period beginning on the date on which the 5 6 term of such member expires, if no new member 7 is appointed to replace the departing board 8 member. 9 (B) INITIAL APPOINTED MEMBERS.—Of the initial members of the Board appointed 10 11 under paragraph (4)(A), half of such members 12 shall serve for four years and half of such mem-13 bers shall serve for five years, as determined by 14 the Chair of the Board. 15 (C) VACANCIES.—Any vacancy in the 16 membership of the appointed members of the 17 Board-18 (i) shall be filled in accordance with

(i) shall be filled in accordance with the bylaws of the Foundation by an individual capable of representing the same area or entity, as applicable, as represented by the vacating board member under paragraph (2)(B)(ii);

1	(ii) shall not affect the power of the
2	remaining appointed members to carry out
3	the duties of the Board; and
4	(iii) shall be filled by an individual se-
5	lected by the Board.
6	(5) QUORUM.—A majority of the members of
7	the Board shall constitute a quorum for the pur-
8	poses of conducting the business of the Board.
9	(6) DUTIES.—The Board shall carry out the
10	following:
11	(A) Establish bylaws for the Foundation in
12	accordance with paragraph (7).
13	(B) Provide overall direction for the activi-
14	ties of the Foundation and establish priority ac-
15	tivities.
16	(C) Coordinate with the Institute the ac-
17	tivities of the Foundation to ensure consistency
18	with the programs and policies of the Institute.
19	(D) Evaluate the performance of the Exec-
20	utive Director of the Foundation.
21	(E) Actively solicit and accept funds, gifts,
22	grants, devises, or bequests of real or personal
23	property to the Foundation, including from pri-
24	vate entities.

1	(F) Carry out any other necessary activi-
2	ties of the Foundation.
3	(7) Bylaws.—The Board shall establish bylaws
4	for the Foundation. In establishing such bylaws, the
5	Board shall ensure the following:
6	(A) The bylaws of the Foundation include
7	the following:
8	(i) Policies for the selection of the
9	Board members, officers, employees,
10	agents, and contractors of the Foundation.
11	(ii) Policies, including ethical and dis-
12	closure standards, for the following:
13	(I) The acceptance, solicitation,
14	and disposition of donations and
15	grants to the Foundation, including
16	appropriate limits on the ability of do-
17	nors to designate, by stipulation or re-
18	striction, the use or recipient of do-
19	nated funds.
20	(II) The disposition of assets of
21	the Foundation.
22	(iii) Policies that subject all employ-
23	ees, fellows, trainees, and other agents of
24	the Foundation (including appointed voting

1	members and ex officio members of the
2	Board) to conflict of interest standards.
3	(iv) The specific duties of the Execu-
4	tive Director of the Foundation.
5	(B) The bylaws of the Foundation and ac-
6	tivities carried out under such bylaws do not—
7	(i) reflect unfavorably upon the ability
8	of the Foundation to carry out its respon-
9	sibilities or official duties in a fair and ob-
10	jective manner; or
11	(ii) compromise, or appear to com-
12	promise, the integrity of any governmental
13	agency or program, or any officer or em-
14	ployee employed by, or involved in a gov-
15	ernmental agency or program.
16	(8) RESTRICTION ON MEMBERSHIP.—No em-
17	ployee of the Department of Commerce may be ap-
18	pointed as a member of the Board of Directors.
19	(9) Compensation.—
20	(A) IN GENERAL.—Members of the Board
21	may not receive compensation for serving on
22	the Board.
23	(B) CERTAIN EXPENSES.—In accordance
24	with the bylaws of the Foundation, members of
25	the Board may be reimbursed for travel ex-

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1	penses, including per diem in lieu of subsist-
2	ence, and other necessary expenses incurred in
3	carrying out the duties of the Board.
4	(10) LIAISON REPRESENTATIVES.—The Sec-
5	retary, acting through the Director, shall designate
6	representatives from across the Institute to serve as
7	the liaisons to the Board and the Foundation.
8	(j) Administration.—
9	(1) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—
10	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Foundation shall
11	have an Executive Director who shall be ap-
12	pointed by the Board, and who shall serve at
13	the pleasure of the Board, and for whom the
14	Board shall establish the rate of compensation.
15	Subject to the bylaws established under sub-
16	section $(i)(7)$ , the Executive Director shall be
17	responsible for the daily operations of the
18	Foundation in carrying out the activities of the
19	Foundation under subsection (c).
20	(B) Responsibilities.—In carrying out
21	the daily operations of the Foundation, the Ex-
22	ecutive Director of the Foundation shall carry
23	out the following:
24	(i) Hire, promote, compensate, and
25	discharge officers and employees of the

Foundation, and define the duties of such
officers and employees.
(ii) Accept and administer donations
to the Foundation, and administer the as-
sets of the Foundation.
(iii) Enter into such contracts and
execute legal instruments as are appro-
priate in carrying out the activities of the
Foundation.
(iv) Perform such other functions as
necessary to operate the Foundation.
(2) Administrative control.—No member
of the Board, officer or employee of the Foundation
or of any program established by the Foundation, or
participant in a program established by the Founda-
tion, may exercise administrative control over any
Federal employee.
(3) TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO INSTITUTE.—The
Foundation may transfer funds and property to the
Institute, which the Institute may accept and use
and which shall be subject to all applicable Federal
limitations relating to federally funded research.
(4) Strategic plan.—Not later than one year
after the establishment of the Foundation, the
Foundation shall submit to the Committee on

1	Science, Space, and Technology of the House of
2	Representatives and the Committee on Commerce,
3	Science, and Transportation of the Senate a stra-
4	tegic plan that contains the following:
5	(A) A plan for the Foundation to become
6	financially self-sustaining in the next five years.
7	(B) Short- and long-term objectives of the
8	Foundation, as identified by the Board.
9	(C) A description of the efforts the Foun-
10	dation will take to be transparent in the proc-
11	esses of the Foundation, including processes re-
12	lating to the following:
13	(i) Grant awards, including selection,
14	review, and notification.
15	(ii) Communication of past, current,
16	and future research priorities.
17	(iii) Solicitation of and response to
18	public input on the priorities identified by
19	the Foundation.
20	(D) A description of the financial goals
21	and benchmarks of the Foundation for the fol-
22	lowing ten years.
23	(E) A description of the efforts undertaken
24	by the Foundation to ensure maximum

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complementarity and minimum redundancy with investments made by the Institute.

(5) Report.—

4 (A) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 18 5 months after the establishment of the Founda-6 tion and not later than February 1 of each year 7 thereafter, the Foundation shall publish a re-8 port describing the activities of the Foundation 9 during the immediately preceding fiscal year. 10 Each such report shall include with respect to 11 such fiscal year a comprehensive statement of 12 the operations, activities, financial condition, 13 progress, and accomplishments of the Founda-14 tion.

15 (B) FINANCIAL CONDITION.—With respect 16 to the financial condition of the Foundation, 17 each report under subparagraph (A) shall in-18 clude the source, and a description of, all sup-19 port under subsection (g) provided to the Foun-20 dation. Each such report shall identify the per-21 sons or entities from which such support is re-22 ceived, and include a specification of any re-23 strictions on the purposes for which such sup-24 port may be used.

1	(C) PUBLICATION.—The Foundation shall
2	make copies of each report submitted under
3	subparagraph (A) available—
4	(i) for public inspection, and shall
5	upon request provide a copy of the report
6	to any individual for a charge not to ex-
7	ceed the cost of providing such copy; and
8	(ii) to the Committee on Science,
9	Space, and Technology of the House of
10	Representatives and the Committee on
11	Commerce, Science, and Transportation of
12	the Senate.
13	(6) AUDITS AND DISCLOSURE.—The Founda-
14	tion shall—
15	(A) provide for annual audits of the finan-
16	cial condition of the Foundation, including a
17	full list of the Foundation's donors and any re-
18	strictions on the purposes for which gifts to the
19	Foundation may be used; and
20	(B) make such audits, and all other
21	records, documents, and other papers of the
22	Foundation, available to the Secretary and the
23	Comptroller General of the United States for
24	examination or audit.

1	(7) EVALUATION BY COMPTROLLER GEN-
2	ERAL.—Not later than five years after the date on
3	which the Foundation is established, the Comptroller
4	General of the United States shall submit to the
5	Committee on Science, Space, and Technology of the
6	House of Representatives and the Committee on
7	Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Sen-
8	ate the following:
9	(A) An evaluation of the following:
10	(i) The extent to which the Founda-
11	tion is achieving the mission of the Foun-
12	dation.
13	(ii) The operation of the Foundation.
14	(B) Any recommendations on how the
15	Foundation may be improved.
16	(k) INTEGRITY.—
17	(1) IN GENERAL.—To ensure integrity in the
18	operations of the Foundation, the Board shall de-
19	velop and enforce procedures relating to standards
20	of conduct, financial disclosure statements, conflicts
21	of interest (including recusal and waiver rules), au-
22	dits, and any other matters determined appropriate
23	by the Board.
24	(2) FINANCIAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST.—To
25	mitigate conflicts of interest and risks from malign

1	foreign influence, any individual who is an officer,
2	employee, or member of the Board is prohibited
3	from any participation in deliberations by the Foun-
4	dation of a matter that would directly or predictably
5	affect any financial interest of any of the following:
6	(A) Such individual.
7	(B) A relative of such individual.
8	(C) A business organization or other entity
9	in which such individual has an interest, includ-
10	ing an organization or other entity with which
11	such individual is negotiating employment.
12	(1) INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY.—The Board shall
13	adopt written standards to govern the ownership and li-
14	censing of any intellectual property rights developed by the
15	Foundation or derived from the collaborative efforts of the
16	Foundation
17	(m) Full Faith and Credit.—The United States
18	shall not be liable for any debts, defaults, acts, or omis-
19	sions of the Foundation. The full faith and credit of the
20	United States shall not extend to any obligations of the
21	Foundation.
22	(n) SUPPORT SERVICES.—The Secretary, acting
23	through the Director, may provide facilities, utilities, and
24	support services to the Foundation if it is determined by

the Director to be advantageous to the research programs
 of the Institute.

- 3 (o) NONAPPLICABILITY.—Chapter 10 of title 5,
  4 United States Code, shall not apply to the Foundation.
  5 (p) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
  6 are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary
  7 \$1,500,000 for each of fiscal years 2025 through 2029
  8 to carry out this section.
- 9 (q) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:
- 10 (1) BOARD.—The term "Board" means the
  11 Board of Directors of the Foundation, established
  12 pursuant to subsection (i).
- 13 (2) DIRECTOR.—The term "Director" means
  14 the Director of the National Institute of Standards
  15 and Technology.
- 16 (3)EPSCOR INSTITUTION.—The term 17 "EPSCoR institution" means an institution of high-18 er education, nonprofit organization, or other insti-19 tution located in a jurisdiction eligible to participate 20 in the program under section 113 of the National 21 Science Foundation Authorization Act of 1988 (42) 22 U.S.C. 1862g).
- (4) FOUNDATION.—The term "Foundation"
  means the Foundation for Standards and Metrology
  established pursuant to subsection (a).

(5) HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGE AND UNI VERSITY.—The term "historically Black college and
 university" has the meaning given the term "part B
 institution" in section 322 of the Higher Education
 Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1061).
 (6) INSTITUTE.—The term "Institute" means
 the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

8 (7) INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.—The
9 term "institution of higher education" has the
10 meaning given such term in section 101 of the High11 er Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001).

12 (8) NIST ASSOCIATE.—The term "NIST asso-13 ciate" means any guest researcher, facility user, vol-14 unteer, or other nonemployee of the National Insti-15 tute of Standards and Technology who conducts re-16 search or otherwise engages in an authorized activity 17 with National Institute of Standards and Technology 18 personnel or at a National Institute of Standards 19 and Technology facility.

(9) MINORITY-SERVING INSTITUTION.—The
term "minority-serving institution" means the entities specified in section 371(a) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1067q(a)).

1	(10) Relative.—The term "relative" has the
2	meaning given such term in section 13101 of title 5,
3	United States Code.
4	(11) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary"
5	means the Secretary of Commerce.
6	(12) TECHNICAL STANDARD.—The term "tech-
7	nical standard" has the meaning given such term in
8	section $12(d)(5)$ of the National Technology Trans-
9	fer and Advancement Act of 1995 (15 U.S.C. 272
10	note).
11	(13) TRIBAL COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY.—The
12	term "Tribal College or University" has the meaning
13	given in section 316 of the Higher Education Act of
14	1965 (20 U.S.C. 1059c).

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
