

**AMENDMENT**  
**OFFERED BY MRS. SYKES OF OHIO**

Insert, at the appropriate place, the following:

1 **SEC. \_\_\_\_.** **IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT SCENARIO-BASED**  
2 **TRAINING CURRICULUM.**

3 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—Not later than 90 days after the  
4 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland  
5 Security shall, in coordination with the Director of the  
6 Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers, develop a  
7 scenario-based training curriculum and certification pro-  
8 cess that immigration officers are required to complete an-  
9 nually.

10 (b) **CURRICULUM.**—In developing the curriculum  
11 under subsection (a), the Secretary of Homeland Security  
12 shall—

13 (1) develop a scenario-based training cur-  
14 rriculum that addresses—

15 (A) improving community-police relations;

16 (B) officer safety;

17 (C) officer resilience;

18 (D) situational awareness;

19 (E) physical and emotional responses to  
20 stress;

1 (F) critical decision making and problem  
2 solving;

3 (G) de-escalation;

4 (H) use of force and deadly force; and

5 (I) crisis intervention;

6 (2) consult with relevant professional law en-  
7 forcement associations, community-based organiza-  
8 tions, and defense and national security agencies in  
9 the development and dissemination of the cur-  
10 riculum;

11 (3) provide expertise and technical assistance to  
12 components seeking to implement the curriculum;

13 (4) evaluate best practices of scenario-based  
14 training methods and curriculum content to main-  
15 tain state-of-the-art expertise in scenario-based  
16 learning methodology; and

17 (5) develop a certification process for immigra-  
18 tion officers that have successfully completed the  
19 curriculum.

20 (c) REPORT.—Not later than 180 days after the date  
21 of enactment of this section, the Secretary of Homeland  
22 Security shall submit to Congress a report on—

23 (1) any benefits of, and barriers to, delivering  
24 the curriculum for immigration officers; and

1           (2) recommendations for improving the access  
2 of immigration officers to scenario-based training.

3           (d) IMMIGRATION OFFICER DEFINED.—In this sec-  
4 tion, the term “immigration officer” means—

5           (1) any employee or class of employee—

6           (A) designated to perform the functions of  
7 an immigration officer within the meaning of  
8 the term under section 101 of the Immigration  
9 and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101); and

10           (B) designated to arrest persons under sec-  
11 tion 287(a) of the Immigration and Nationality  
12 Act (8 U.S.C. 1357(a)); and

13           (2) any officer of a State, or any political sub-  
14 division of a State, performing functions of an immi-  
15 gration officer under section 287(g) of the Immigra-  
16 tion and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1357(g)).

17           (e) ICE TRAINING.—Section 287 of the Immigration  
18 and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1357) is amended by add-  
19 ing at the end the following:

20           “(i) Before performing duties to enforce the immigra-  
21 tion laws, an immigration officer or employee shall be re-  
22 quired to complete not less than 67 days of training.”.
