AMENDMENT TO RULES COMM. PRINT 115-70 OFFERED BY MR. TROTT OF MICHIGAN

At the end of subtitle F of title XII, add the following:

1	SEC. 12 SENSE OF CONGRESS REGARDING WAR
2	CRIMES, CRIMES AGAINST HUMANITY, AND
3	GENOCIDE AGAINST VULNERABLE RELI-
4	GIOUS AND ETHNIC GROUPS IN THE MIDDLE
5	EAST.
6	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
7	(1) The lessons of past genocides should be ap-
8	plied to help prevent future war crimes, crimes
9	against humanity, and genocide.
10	(2) On March 17, 2016, the Department of
11	State declared that "Da'esh is responsible for geno-
12	cide against groups in areas under its control, in-
13	cluding Yezidis, Christians, and Shia Muslims", and
14	is "also responsible for crimes against humanity and
15	ethnic cleansing directed at these same groups and
16	in some cases against Sunni Muslims and Kurds and
17	other minorities.".
18	(3) The House of Representatives, on March
19	14, 2016, passed H. Con. Res. 75, which concluded

1 that "the atrocities perpetrated by ISIL against 2 Christians, Yezidis, and other religious and ethnic 3 minorities in Iraq and Syria constitute war crimes, 4 crimes against humanity, and genocide". 5 (4) The Senate, on July 7, 2016, passed S. 6 Res. 340, which concluded that "the atrocities per-7 petrated by the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant 8 (ISIL) against Christians, Yezidis, Shi'a, and other 9 religious and ethnic minorities in Iraq and Syria 10 constitute war crimes, crimes against humanity, and 11 genocide". 12 (5) The United States has a proud record of 13 protesting and providing relief to Armenian and 14 other Christian survivors of the Ottoman Empire's 15 genocidal campaign. 16 (6) President Woodrow Wilson encouraged the 17 formation of the Near East Relief, chartered by an 18 Act of Congress, which raised \$116,000,000 (over 19 \$2,500,000,000 in 2017 dollars) between 1915 and 20 1930, the Senate adopted resolutions condemning 21 these massacres, and United States diplomats orga-22 nized and led protests of these crimes. 23 (7) The United States is on record as having 24 officially recognized the Armenian Genocide, in the 25 United States Government's May 28, 1951, written

2	garding the Convention on the Prevention and Pun-
3	ishment of the Crime of Genocide, through President
4	Ronald Reagan's April 22, 1981, Proclamation No.
5	4838, and by House Joint Resolution 148, adopted
6	on April 8, 1975, and House Joint Resolution 247,
7	adopted on September 10, 1984.
8	(8) The proper commemoration and consistent
9	condemnation of the Armenian Genocide will
10	strengthen our international standing in preventing
11	modern day genocides.
12	(b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
13	gress that the United States, in seeking to prevent war
14	crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide against
15	Christians, Yezidis, Muslims, Kurds, and other vulnerable
16	religious and ethnic groups in the Middle East, should
17	draw upon relevant lessons of the United States Govern-
18	ment, civil society, and humanitarian response to the Ar-
19	menian Genocide, Seyfo, and the broader genocidal cam-
20	paign by the Ottoman Empire against Armenians, Assyr-
21	ians, Chaldeans, Syriacs, Greeks, Pontians and other
22	Christians upon their biblical era homelands.
