16 SEC. 5105. GAO STUDY ON FOREIGN DRONES.

(a) STUDY.—The Comptroller General shall conduct
a study on the use of foreign-made unmanned aircraft systems in the Federal Government unmanned aircraft fleet.
(b) ELEMENTS.—The study under subsection (a)
shall include an assessment of the following:

(1) The size of the Federal unmanned aircraft
fleet and the extent to which any unmanned aircraft
systems have been procured from a covered foreign

1 entity on the list maintained in Supplement No. 4 2 to part 744 of title 15, Code of Federal Regulations. 3 (2) The operation of these systems across the Federal Government. 4 (3) Policies and practices governing the pro-5 6 curement of unmanned aircraft systems from cov-7 ered foreign entities. 8 (4) The availability of unmanned aircraft sys-9 tems from any domestic sources for government use. 10 (5) The risks associated with use of these sys-11 tems by the Federal Government, including physical 12 safety, privacy, and cybersecurity. 13 (c) GAO REPORT.—Not later than one year after the 14 date of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General 15 shall report to Congress all findings and determinations

16 made in carrying out the study required under subsection17 (a).

21 SEC. 5201. NATIONAL DRONE AND ADVANCED AIR MOBIL-

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ITY RESEARCH INSTITUTES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration may establish a program to award financial assistance for the plan-

1 ning, establishment, and support of a network of Insti2 tutes (as described in subsection (b)(2)) in accordance

4 (b) FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO ESTABLISH AND
5 SUPPORT NATIONAL DRONE AND ADVANCED AIR MOBIL6 ITY RESEARCH INSTITUTES.—

9 (F) establishes a robust data management 10 strategy that ensures digital access and ma-11 chine-readability; that promotes findability, 12 interoperability, analysis- and decision-readiness 13 and reusability; and ensures applicable scientific 14 data are managed for wide use by Federal, 15 State, Tribal, and local governments, academia, 16 and the public;

17 (G) applies lessons learned from unmanned
18 aircraft systems research, development, dem19 onstration, and testing to advanced air mobility
20 systems; and

(H) supports high quality workforce development in advanced air mobility and unmanned
aircraft systems related disciplines in the
United States, including increasing the partici-

pation of groups historically underrepresented
 in STEM, among other goals.

3 (3) USE OF FUNDS.—Financial assistance
4 awarded under paragraph (1) may be used by an In5 stitute for—

TITLE LX—LIMITATION

9 SEC. 5911. LIMITATION.

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—Except as otherwise provided in 11 this section, none of the funds authorized to be appro-12 priated by this division may be used for the purchase, ac-13 quisition, research, development, or operation of advanced 14 air mobility and unmanned aircraft systems—

(1) produced or assembled in, or containing
components produced or assembled in, a foreign
country of concern; or

(2) produced or assembled by entities owned,
controlled by, or subject to the jurisdiction or direction of the government of, a foreign country of concern.

(b) EXCEPTION.—The limitation in subsection (a)
shall not apply to the acquisition of advanced air mobility
and unmanned aircraft systems for the purposes of research and development for improving the United States
counter-UAS systems and detection systems capabilities.

(c) WAIVER.—The Secretary of Commerce may waive
 the limitation in subsection (a) if the Secretary deter mines, in consultation with the Director of National Intel ligence, that such waiver is in the national security inter est of the United States.

6 (d) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—The Secretary of Com7 merce shall report the issuance of such a waiver to the
8 relevant committees of jurisdiction of Congress not later
9 than 30 days after issuing such waiver.

10 (e) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term "foreign
11 country of concern" means—

(1) a country that is a covered nation (as defined in section 4872(d)(2) of title 10 United States
Code); or

(2) any other country that the Secretary of
Commerce, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and the Director of National Intelligence, determines to be engaged in conduct that is detrimental to the national security or foreign policy of
the United States.

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
