

AMENDMENT TO RULES COMM. PRINT 119–8
OFFERED BY MR. STEUBE OF FLORIDA

At the end of subtitle C of title XII, add the following:

1 **SEC. 12____. EXTENSION AND MODIFICATION OF ANNUAL**
2 **REPORT ON MILITARY POWER OF IRAN.**

3 (a) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—Subsection (b) of
4 section 1245 of the National Defense Authorization Act
5 for Fiscal Year 2010 (10 U.S.C. 113 note) is amended—

6 (1) in paragraph (1)—

7 (A) by redesignating subparagraphs (B),
8 (C), (D), and (E) as subparagraphs (D), (E),
9 (F) and (G), respectively;

10 (B) by adding after subparagraph (A) the
11 following subparagraphs:

12 “(B) the evolving use of terrorism in Iran’s
13 security strategy, be it direct or indirect via
14 proxy;

15 “(C) evolving thresholds for the use of di-
16 rect and attributable force by Iran;”.

17 (C) in subparagraph (F), by striking
18 “and” at the end;

1 (D) in subparagraph (G), by striking the
2 period at the end and inserting “; and”; and

3 (E) by adding after subparagraph (G) the
4 following subparagraph:

5 “(H) how Iran believes an integrated
6 American, Arab, and Israeli regional security
7 architecture focused on intelligence sharing, air
8 and missile defense, and maritime security
9 would create challenges for Iranian grand strat-
10 egy, security strategy, and military strategy.”;

11 (2) in paragraph (2)—

12 (A) by redesignating subparagraphs (C)
13 and (D) as subparagraphs (D) and (E), respec-
14 tively;

15 (B) in subparagraph (D), by striking “;
16 and” at the end; and

17 (C) by adding after subparagraph (B) the
18 following subparagraph:

19 “(C) a summary of Iran’s procurement of
20 advanced conventional capabilities from Russia
21 and the impact of these procurements on Iran’s
22 military capabilities, Israel’s Qualitative Mili-
23 tary Edge, and Iran’s conventional forces as as-
24 sessed under subparagraph (B);”;

25 (3) in paragraph (3)—

1 (A) in subparagraph (C), by inserting “any
2 Iraqi Shia-militia operating under the auspices
3 of the ‘Islamic Resistance,’” after “the Badr
4 Organization,”;

5 (B) in subparagraph (E), by striking the
6 semicolon at the end and inserting “, including
7 United States forces in Iraq, Syria, Jordan, and
8 the Red Sea;”

9 (C) in subparagraph (I)(ii), by striking
10 “and activities; and” and inserting “, assets,
11 and critical infrastructure; and”;

12 (D) in subparagraph (J), by striking “abil-
13 ity to manipulate the information environment
14 both domestically and against the interests of
15 the United States and its allies; and” and in-
16 serting “information warfare efforts designed to
17 oppress the Iranian people and undermine the
18 United States, its allies, and its interests;”

19 (C) in subparagraph (K), by striking the
20 period at the end and inserting “; and”; and

21 (D) by adding at the end the following
22 subparagraph:

23 “(L) an assessment of the military power
24 of Iranian proxies and partners, including

1 Hezbollah, Hamas, Palestine Islamic Jihad,
2 Ansar Allah, and Iraqi and Syrian proxies.”;
3 (4) in paragraph (4)—

4 (A) in subparagraph (A), by striking “nu-
5 clear weapons capabilities and developments”
6 and inserting “nuclear weapons-related ad-
7 vances, including growth of atomic infrastruc-
8 ture, fissile material inventories and purity, and
9 weaponization-related activities”;

10 (B) by redesignating subparagraphs (G) as
11 subparagraph (I);

12 (C) in subparagraph (F), by striking “to
13 the Middle East and Europe; and” and insert-
14 ing “globally;”; and

15 (D) by adding after subparagraph (F) the
16 following subparagraphs:

17 “(G) a detailed analysis of the domestic
18 and foreign supply chains supporting Iran’s
19 drone program;

20 “(H) a detailed assessment of the domestic
21 production capacity by Iran’s proxies in the
22 Middle East of long-range strike capabilities, to
23 include mortars, IRAMs, rockets, drones, cruise
24 missiles, and ballistic missiles; and”;

1 (5) in paragraph (5), by striking “nuclear de-
2 velopment, ballistic missiles, and chemical, biological,
3 and advanced conventional weapons, weapon sys-
4 tems, and delivery vehicles” and inserting “nuclear
5 weapons, missiles and drones, and chemical, biologi-
6 cal, and advanced conventional weapons and their
7 delivery vehicles”; and

8 (6) in paragraph (8)—

9 (A) by striking “or any foreign terrorist
10 organization.” and inserting “the Badr Organi-
11 zation, any other foreign terrorist organization,
12 or any special designated global terrorist.”;

13 (B) by striking “the Bashar al-Assad re-
14 gime,” and inserting “the Russian Federation,
15 elements of the former Bashar al-Assad re-
16 gime,”; and

17 (C) by inserting “Ansarallah,” after
18 “ Hamas,”.

19 (b) DEFINITIONS.—Subsection (c) of such section is
20 amended—

21 (1) in paragraph (3), by striking the period at
22 the end and inserting “regardless of whether they
23 are surface-to-surface or anti-ship missiles.”; and

1 (2) in paragraph (4), by striking the period at
2 the end and inserting “regardless of whether they
3 are surface-to-surface or anti-ship missiles.”.

4 (c) TERMINATION.—Subsection (d) of such section is
5 amended by striking “December 31, 2026” and inserting
6 “December 31, 2030”.
