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To authorize the President to award the Medal of Honor to Joseph M. Perez for acts of valor while serving as a member of the Army during the Vietnam War.

AUGUST 8, 2023 Mr. MOYLAN introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Armed Services

## A BILL

To authorize the President to award the Medal of Honor to Joseph M. Perez for acts of valor while serving as a member of the Army during the Vietnam War.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF AWARD OF MEDAL OF
4 HONOR TO JOSEPH M. PEREZ FOR ACTS OF
5 VALOR AS A MEMBER OF THE ARMY DURING
6 THE VIETNAM WAR.

7 (a) RECOGNITION OF ACTS OF VALOR.—Congress8 recognizes the following acts of valor by Joseph M. Perez:

(1) Joseph M. Perez distinguished himself by
 valorous actions against overwhelming odds while
 serving as a Sergeant in the Army, with Company
 C, 3rd Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infan try Division, in South Vietnam.

6 (2) On May 26, 1967, during the Vietnam War, 7 Sergeant Perez acted as the fire team leader with 8 the Commanding Officer of Company C led an in-9 fantry unit conducting a search and destroy task 10 near the Cambodian border. When the unit reached 11 the top of a hill, they were suddenly under attack 12 from a concealed sniper.

13 (3) During the initial phase of battle, Sergeant 14 Perez and the unit took cover to assess and decide 15 the strength of the enemy and determine the erec-16 tion of where the attack was coming from. The fire 17 team returned fire, when the enemy launched a 18 hand-grenade. Without hesitation or concern for his 19 personal safety, Sergeant Perez absorbed the full le-20 thal explosion and shielded his fellow soldiers from 21 the blast. The explosion caused Sergeant Perez to 22 lose his right eye and severed his right hand.

(4) The fire team moved to relocate to a saferarea, leaving Sgt Perez alone. Once Sgt Perez re-

1	gained consciousness, he crawled to safe ground
2	twenty meters to be able to be treated by medics.
3	(5) Sergeant Perez's personal leadership in in-
4	tense close combat resulted in a major win for his
5	battalion against overwhelming odds, though he lost
6	his eye and hand and nearly lost his life, he saved
7	the lives of three of his fire team members from
8	death and serious injuries from the explosion.
9	(6) Sergeant Perez's selfless devotion to duty,
10	his extraordinary heroism, conspicuous gallantry and
11	intrepidity, and numerous risks of his life above and
12	beyond the call of duty, are all in keeping with the
13	highest traditions of the Army, and reflect great
14	credit on himself, the Armed Forces, and the United
15	States.
16	(b) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-
17	ings:
18	(1) When awarding him the Distinguished Serv-
19	ice Cross, Sergeant Perez's chain of command was
20	unaware of the full extent of his valorous actions
21	and the numerous risks he took for his soldiers, all
22	above and beyond the call of duty.
23	(2) Although Sergeant Perez absorbed the le-
24	thal explosion of a hand grenade, once he regained
25	consciousness, he continued to move with his bat-

talion against devastating and overwhelming enemy
 fire.

3 (c) AUTHORIZATION.—Notwithstanding the time lim-4 itations specified in section 7274 of title 10, United States 5 Code, or any other time limitation with respect to the awarding of certain medals to persons who served in the 6 7 Armed Forces, the President is authorized to award the Medal of Honor, under section 7271 of such title, to Jo-8 9 seph M. Perez for the acts of valor described in subsection 10 (d).

(d) ACTS OF VALOR DESCRIBED.—The acts of valor
described in this subsection are the actions of Joseph M.
Perez on May 26, 1967, while serving as a member of
the Army during the Vietnam War, for which he was previously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

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
