At the end of title XVII (page 1115, after line 5),  
add the following:

1                   **Subtitle F—**\_\_\_\_\_

2   **SEC. 1771. SHORT TITLE.**

3           This subtitle may be cited as the “National Oceanic  
4 and Atmospheric Administration Commissioned Officer  
5 Corps Amendments Act of 2020”.

6   **SEC. 1772. REFERENCES TO NATIONAL OCEANIC AND AT-**  
7                   **MOSPHERIC   ADMINISTRATION   COMMIS-**  
8                   **SIONED OFFICER CORPS ACT OF 2002.**

9           Except as otherwise expressly provided, any place in  
10 this subtitle an amendment or repeal is expressed in terms  
11 of an amendment to, or repeal of, a section or other provi-  
12 sion, the reference shall be considered to be made to a  
13 section or other provision of the National Oceanic and At-  
14 mospheric Administration Commissioned Officer Corps  
15 Act of 2002 (33 U.S.C. 3001 et seq.).

1           **CHAPTER 1—GENERAL PROVISIONS**

2   **SEC. 1773. STRENGTH AND DISTRIBUTION IN GRADE.**

3           Section 214 (33 U.S.C. 3004) is amended to read as  
4 follows:

5   **“SEC. 214. STRENGTH AND DISTRIBUTION IN GRADE.**

6           “(a) GRADES.—The commissioned grades in the com-  
7 missioned officer corps of the Administration are the fol-  
8 lowing, in relative rank with officers of the Navy:

9                   “(1) Vice admiral.

10                   “(2) Rear admiral.

11                   “(3) Rear admiral (lower half).

12                   “(4) Captain.

13                   “(5) Commander.

14                   “(6) Lieutenant commander.

15                   “(7) Lieutenant.

16                   “(8) Lieutenant (junior grade).

17                   “(9) Ensign.

18           “(b) GRADE DISTRIBUTION.—The Secretary shall  
19 prescribe, with respect to the distribution on the lineal list  
20 in grade, the percentages applicable to the grades set forth  
21 in subsection (a).

22           “(c) ANNUAL COMPUTATION OF NUMBER IN  
23 GRADE.—

24                   “(1) IN GENERAL.—Not less frequently than  
25           once each year, the Secretary shall determine the

1 number of officers on the lineal list authorized to be  
2 serving in each grade.

3 “(2) METHOD OF DETERMINATION.—The num-  
4 ber in each grade shall be determined by applying  
5 the applicable percentage to the total number of  
6 such officers serving on active duty on the date the  
7 computation is made.

8 “(3) FRACTIONS.—If a final fraction occurs in  
9 computing the authorized number of officers in a  
10 grade, the nearest whole number shall be taken. If  
11 the fraction is  $\frac{1}{2}$ , the next higher whole number  
12 shall be taken.

13 “(d) TEMPORARY INCREASE IN NUMBERS.—The  
14 total number of officers authorized by law to be on the  
15 lineal list during a fiscal year may be temporarily exceeded  
16 if the average number on that list during that fiscal year  
17 does not exceed the authorized number.

18 “(e) POSITIONS OF IMPORTANCE AND RESPONSI-  
19 BILITY.—Officers serving in positions designated under  
20 section 228(a) and officers recalled from retired status  
21 shall not be counted when computing authorized strengths  
22 under subsection (c) and shall not count against those  
23 strengths.

24 “(f) PRESERVATION OF GRADE AND PAY.—No offi-  
25 cer may be reduced in grade or pay or separated from

1 the commissioned officer corps of the Administration as  
2 the result of a computation made to determine the author-  
3 ized number of officers in the various grades.”.

4 **SEC. 1774. RECALLED OFFICERS.**

5 Section 215 (33 U.S.C. 3005) is amended—

6 (1) by striking “Effective October 1, 2009, the”  
7 and inserting “(a) IN GENERAL.—The”;

8 (2) by striking “be increased from 321 to 379  
9 if—” and all that follows through “fiscal year.” and  
10 inserting “not to exceed 500.”; and

11 (3) by adding at the end the following new sub-  
12 section:

13 “(b) POSITIONS OF IMPORTANCE AND RESPONSI-  
14 BILITY.—Officers serving in positions designated under  
15 section 228 and officers recalled from retired status or de-  
16 tailed to an agency other than the Administration—

17 “(1) may not be counted in determining the  
18 total number of authorized officers on the lineal list  
19 under this section; and

20 “(2) may not count against such number.”.

21 **SEC. 1775. OBLIGATED SERVICE REQUIREMENT.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle A (33 U.S.C. 3001 et  
23 seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:

24 **“SEC. 216. OBLIGATED SERVICE REQUIREMENT.**

25 “(a) IN GENERAL.—

1           “(1) REGULATIONS.—The Secretary shall pre-  
2           scribe the obligated service requirements for appoint-  
3           ments, training, promotions, separations, continu-  
4           ations, and retirement of officers not otherwise cov-  
5           ered by law.

6           “(2) WRITTEN AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary  
7           and officers shall enter into written agreements that  
8           describe the officers’ obligated service requirements  
9           prescribed under paragraph (1) in return for such  
10          appointments, training, promotions, separations, and  
11          retirements as the Secretary considers appropriate.

12          “(b) REPAYMENT FOR FAILURE TO SATISFY RE-  
13          QUIREMENTS.—

14               “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may require  
15               an officer who fails to meet the service requirements  
16               prescribed under subsection (a)(1) to reimburse the  
17               Secretary in an amount that bears the same ratio to  
18               the total costs of the training provided to that offi-  
19               cer by the Secretary as the unserved portion of ac-  
20               tive duty bears to the total period of active duty the  
21               officer agreed to serve.

22               “(2) OBLIGATION AS DEBT TO UNITED  
23               STATES.—An obligation to reimburse the Secretary  
24               under paragraph (1) shall be considered for all pur-  
25               poses as a debt owed to the United States.

1           “(3) DISCHARGE IN BANKRUPTCY.—A dis-  
2 charge in bankruptcy under title 11 that is entered  
3 less than 5 years after the termination of a written  
4 agreement entered into under subsection (a)(2) does  
5 not discharge the individual signing the agreement  
6 from a debt arising under such agreement.

7           “(c) WAIVER OR SUSPENSION OF COMPLIANCE.—  
8 The Secretary may waive the service obligation of an offi-  
9 cer who—

10           “(1) becomes unqualified to serve on active  
11 duty in the commissioned officer corps of the Ad-  
12 ministration because of a circumstance not within  
13 the control of such officer; or

14           “(2) is—

15           “(A) not physically qualified for appoint-  
16 ment; and

17           “(B) determined to be unqualified for serv-  
18 ice in the commissioned officer corps of the Ad-  
19 ministration because of a physical or medical  
20 condition that was not the result of the officer’s  
21 own misconduct or grossly negligent conduct.”.

22           (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents  
23 in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
24 Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372) is

1 amended by inserting after the item relating to section  
2 215 the following:

“Sec. 216. Obligated service requirement.”.

3 **SEC. 1776. TRAINING AND PHYSICAL FITNESS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle A (33 U.S.C. 3001 et  
5 seq.), as amended by section 1773 of this subtitle, is fur-  
6 ther amended by adding at the end the following:

7 **“SEC. 217. TRAINING AND PHYSICAL FITNESS.**

8 “(a) TRAINING.—The Secretary may take such meas-  
9 ures as may be necessary to ensure that officers are pre-  
10 pared to carry out their duties in the commissioned officer  
11 corps of the Administration and proficient in the skills  
12 necessary to carry out such duties. Such measures may  
13 include the following:

14 “(1) Carrying out training programs and cor-  
15 respondence courses, including establishing and op-  
16 erating a basic officer training program to provide  
17 initial indoctrination and maritime vocational train-  
18 ing for officer candidates as well as refresher train-  
19 ing, mid-career training, aviation training, and such  
20 other training as the Secretary considers necessary  
21 for officer development and proficiency.

22 “(2) Providing officers and officer candidates  
23 with educational materials and school supplies.

24 “(3) Acquiring such equipment as may be nec-  
25 essary for training and instructional purposes.

1           “(b) **PHYSICAL FITNESS.**—The Secretary shall en-  
2           sure that officers maintain a high physical state of readi-  
3           ness by establishing standards of physical fitness for offi-  
4           cers that are substantially equivalent to those prescribed  
5           for officers of the Coast Guard.”.

6           (b) **CLERICAL AMENDMENT.**—The table of contents  
7           in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
8           Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as  
9           amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
10          after the item relating to section 216 the following:

          “Sec. 217. Training and physical fitness.”.

11       **SEC. 1777. RECRUITING MATERIALS.**

12          (a) **IN GENERAL.**—Subtitle A (33 U.S.C. 3001 et  
13          seq.), as amended by section 1776 of this subtitle, is fur-  
14          ther amended by adding at the end the following:

15       **“SEC. 218. USE OF RECRUITING MATERIALS FOR PUBLIC**  
16                               **RELATIONS.**

17          “The Secretary may use for public relations purposes  
18          of the Department of Commerce any advertising materials  
19          developed for use for recruitment and retention of per-  
20          sonnel for the commissioned officer corps of the Adminis-  
21          tration.”.

22          (b) **CLERICAL AMENDMENT.**—The table of contents  
23          in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
24          Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as



1 amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
2 after the item relating to section 217 the following:

“Sec. 218. Use of recruiting materials for public relations.”.

3 **SEC. 1778. TECHNICAL CORRECTION.**

4 Section 101(21)(C) of title 38, United States Code,  
5 is amended by inserting “in the commissioned officer  
6 corps” before “of the National”.

7 **CHAPTER 2—PARITY AND RECRUITMENT**

8 **SEC. 1779. EDUCATION LOANS.**

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle E (33 U.S.C. 3071 et  
10 seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:

11 **“SEC. 267. EDUCATION LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM.**

12 “(a) AUTHORITY TO REPAY EDUCATION LOANS.—  
13 For the purpose of maintaining an adequate number of  
14 officers on active duty possessing the skills required by  
15 the commissioned officer corps, the Secretary may repay,  
16 in the case of a person described in subsection (b), a loan  
17 that—

18 “(1) was used by the person to finance edu-  
19 cation; and

20 “(2) was obtained from a governmental entity,  
21 private financial institution, educational institution,  
22 or other authorized entity.

23 “(b) ELIGIBLE PERSONS.—To be eligible to obtain  
24 a loan repayment under this section, a person must—

1           “(1) satisfy one of the requirements specified in  
2 subsection (c);

3           “(2) be fully qualified for, or hold, an appoint-  
4 ment as a commissioned officer in the commissioned  
5 officer corps of the Administration; and

6           “(3) sign a written agreement to serve on active  
7 duty, or, if on active duty, to remain on active duty  
8 for a period in addition to any other incurred active  
9 duty obligation.

10       “(c) ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL REQUIRE-  
11 MENTS.—One of the following academic requirements  
12 must be satisfied for purposes of determining the eligi-  
13 bility of an individual for a loan repayment under this sec-  
14 tion:

15           “(1) The person is fully qualified in a profes-  
16 sion that the Secretary has determined to be nec-  
17 essary to meet identified skill shortages in the com-  
18 missioned officer corps.

19           “(2) The person is enrolled as a full-time stu-  
20 dent in the final year of a course of study at an ac-  
21 credited educational institution (as determined by  
22 the Secretary of Education) leading to a degree in  
23 a profession that will meet identified skill shortages  
24 in the commissioned officer corps.

25       “(d) LOAN REPAYMENTS.—

1           “(1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to the limits estab-  
2           lished under paragraph (2), a loan repayment under  
3           this section may consist of the payment of the prin-  
4           cipal, interest, and related expenses of a loan ob-  
5           tained by a person described in subsection (b).

6           “(2) LIMITATION ON AMOUNT.—For each year  
7           of obligated service that a person agrees to serve in  
8           an agreement described in subsection (b)(3), the  
9           Secretary may pay not more than the amount speci-  
10          fied in section 2173(e)(2) of title 10, United States  
11          Code.

12          “(e) ACTIVE DUTY SERVICE OBLIGATION.—

13                 “(1) IN GENERAL.—A person entering into an  
14                 agreement described in subsection (b)(3) incurs an  
15                 active duty service obligation.

16                 “(2) LENGTH OF OBLIGATION DETERMINED  
17                 UNDER REGULATIONS.—

18                         “(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in  
19                         subparagraph (B), the length of the obligation  
20                         under paragraph (1) shall be determined under  
21                         regulations prescribed by the Secretary.

22                         “(B) MINIMUM OBLIGATION.—The regula-  
23                         tions prescribed under subparagraph (A) may  
24                         not provide for a period of obligation of less  
25                         than 1 year for each maximum annual amount,

1           or portion thereof, paid on behalf of the person  
2           for qualified loans.

3           “(3) PERSONS ON ACTIVE DUTY BEFORE EN-  
4           TERING INTO AGREEMENT.—The active duty service  
5           obligation of persons on active duty before entering  
6           into the agreement shall be served after the conclu-  
7           sion of any other obligation incurred under the  
8           agreement.

9           “(f) EFFECT OF FAILURE TO COMPLETE OBLIGA-  
10          TION.—

11           “(1) ALTERNATIVE OBLIGATIONS.—An officer  
12           who is relieved of the officer’s active duty obligation  
13           under this section before the completion of that obli-  
14           gation may be given any alternative obligation, at  
15           the discretion of the Secretary.

16           “(2) REPAYMENT.—An officer who does not  
17           complete the period of active duty specified in the  
18           agreement entered into under subsection (b)(3), or  
19           the alternative obligation imposed under paragraph  
20           (1), shall be subject to the repayment provisions  
21           under section 216.

22           “(g) REGULATIONS.—The Secretary shall prescribe  
23          regulations to carry out this section, including—

24           “(1) standards for qualified loans and author-  
25          ized payees; and

1           “(2) other terms and conditions for the making  
2           of loan repayments.”.

3           (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents  
4 in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
5 Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as  
6 amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
7 after the item relating to section 266 the following:

          “Sec. 267. Education loan repayment program.”.

8   **SEC. 1780. INTEREST PAYMENTS.**

9           (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle E (33 U.S.C. 3071 et  
10 seq.), as amended by section 1779(a) of this subtitle, is  
11 further amended by adding at the end the following:

12   **“SEC. 268. INTEREST PAYMENT PROGRAM.**

13           “(a) AUTHORITY.—The Secretary may pay the inter-  
14 est and any special allowances that accrue on one or more  
15 student loans of an eligible officer, in accordance with this  
16 section.

17           “(b) ELIGIBLE OFFICERS.—An officer is eligible for  
18 the benefit described in subsection (a) while the officer—

19                   “(1) is serving on active duty;

20                   “(2) has not completed more than 3 years of  
21 service on active duty;

22                   “(3) is the debtor on one or more unpaid loans  
23 described in subsection (c); and

24                   “(4) is not in default on any such loan.

1           “(c) STUDENT LOANS.—The authority to make pay-  
2 ments under subsection (a) may be exercised with respect  
3 to the following loans:

4           “(1) A loan made, insured, or guaranteed under  
5 part B of title IV of the Higher Education Act of  
6 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1071 et seq.).

7           “(2) A loan made under part D of such title  
8 (20 U.S.C. 1087a et seq.).

9           “(3) A loan made under part E of such title  
10 (20 U.S.C. 1087aa et seq.).

11          “(d) MAXIMUM BENEFIT.—Interest and any special  
12 allowance may be paid on behalf of an officer under this  
13 section for any of the 36 consecutive months during which  
14 the officer is eligible under subsection (b).

15          “(e) COORDINATION WITH SECRETARY OF EDU-  
16 CATION.—

17           “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall consult  
18 with the Secretary of Education regarding the ad-  
19 ministration of this section.

20           “(2) AUTHORIZATION.—The Secretary is au-  
21 thorized to reimburse to the Secretary of Education  
22 the funds necessary—

23                   “(A) to pay interest and special allowances  
24 on student loans under this section (in accord-  
25 ance with sections 428(o), 455(l), and 464(j) of

1 the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.  
2 1078(o), 1087e(l), and 1087dd(j)); and

3 “(B) for any reasonable administrative  
4 costs incurred by the Secretary of Education in  
5 coordinating the program under this section  
6 with the administration of the student loan pro-  
7 grams under parts B, D, and E of title IV of  
8 the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.  
9 1071 et seq., 1087a et seq., 1087aa et seq.).

10 “(f) SPECIAL ALLOWANCE DEFINED.—In this sec-  
11 tion, the term ‘special allowance’ means a special allow-  
12 ance that is payable under section 438 of the Higher Edu-  
13 cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1087–1).”.

14 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.—

15 (1) Section 428(o) of the Higher Education Act  
16 of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1078(o)) is amended—

17 (A) by striking the subsection heading and  
18 inserting “ARMED FORCES AND NOAA COM-  
19 MISSIONED OFFICER CORPS STUDENT LOAN  
20 INTEREST PAYMENT PROGRAMS”; and

21 (B) in paragraph (1)—

22 (i) by inserting “or section 268 of the  
23 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-  
24 istration Commissioned Officer Corps Act  
25 of 2002” after “Code,”; and

1 (ii) by inserting “or an officer in the  
2 commissioned officer corps of the National  
3 Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,  
4 respectively,” after “Armed Forces”.

5 (2) Sections 455(l) and 464(j) of the Higher  
6 Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1087e(l) and  
7 1087dd(j)) are each amended—

8 (A) by striking the subsection heading and  
9 inserting “ARMED FORCES AND NOAA COM-  
10 MISSIONED OFFICER CORPS STUDENT LOAN  
11 INTEREST PAYMENT PROGRAMS”; and

12 (B) in paragraph (1)—

13 (i) by inserting “or section 268 of the  
14 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-  
15 istration Commissioned Officer Corps Act  
16 of 2002” after “Code,”; and

17 (ii) by inserting “or an officer in the  
18 commissioned officer corps of the National  
19 Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,  
20 respectively” after “Armed Forces”.

21 (c) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents  
22 in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
23 Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as  
24 amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
25 after the item relating to section 267 the following:

“Sec. 268. Interest payment program.”.



1 **SEC. 1781. STUDENT PRE-COMMISSIONING PROGRAM.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle E (33 U.S.C. 3071 et  
3 seq.), as amended by section 1780(a) of this subtitle, is  
4 further amended by adding at the end the following:

5 **“SEC. 269. STUDENT PRE-COMMISSIONING EDUCATION AS-**  
6 **SISTANCE PROGRAM.**

7 “(a) AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSIST-  
8 ANCE.—For the purpose of maintaining adequate numbers  
9 of officers of the commissioned officer corps of the Admin-  
10 istration on active duty, the Secretary may provide finan-  
11 cial assistance to a person described in subsection (b) for  
12 expenses of such person while such person is pursuing on  
13 a full-time basis at an accredited educational institution  
14 (as determined by the Secretary of Education) a program  
15 of education approved by the Secretary that leads to—

16 “(1) a baccalaureate degree in not more than 5  
17 academic years; or

18 “(2) a postbaccalaureate degree.

19 “(b) ELIGIBLE PERSONS.—

20 “(1) IN GENERAL.—A person is eligible to ob-  
21 tain financial assistance under subsection (a) if such  
22 person—

23 “(A) is enrolled on a full-time basis in a  
24 program of education referred to in subsection  
25 (a) at any educational institution described in  
26 such subsection;

1           “(B) meets all of the requirements for ac-  
2           ceptance into the commissioned officer corps of  
3           the Administration except for the completion of  
4           a baccalaureate degree; and

5           “(C) enters into a written agreement with  
6           the Secretary described in paragraph (2).

7           “(2) AGREEMENT.—A written agreement re-  
8           ferred to in paragraph (1)(C) is an agreement be-  
9           tween such person and the Secretary in which such  
10          person—

11          “(A) agrees to accept an appointment as  
12          an officer, if tendered; and

13          “(B) upon completion of such person’s  
14          educational program, agrees to serve on active  
15          duty, immediately after appointment, for—

16                  “(i) up to 3 years if such person re-  
17                  ceived less than 3 years of assistance; and

18                  “(ii) up to 5 years if such person re-  
19                  ceived at least 3 years of assistance.

20          “(c) QUALIFYING EXPENSES.—Expenses for which  
21          financial assistance may be provided under subsection (a)  
22          are the following:

23                  “(1) Tuition and fees charged by the edu-  
24                  cational institution involved.

25                  “(2) The cost of educational materials.

1           “(3) In the case of a program of education  
2           leading to a baccalaureate degree, laboratory ex-  
3           penses.

4           “(4) Such other expenses as the Secretary con-  
5           siders appropriate.

6           “(d) LIMITATION ON AMOUNT.—The Secretary shall  
7           prescribe the amount of financial assistance provided to  
8           a person under subsection (a), which may not exceed the  
9           amount specified in section 2173(e)(2) of title 10, United  
10          States Code, for each year of obligated service that a per-  
11          son agrees to serve in an agreement described in sub-  
12          section (b)(2).

13          “(e) DURATION OF ASSISTANCE.—Financial assist-  
14          ance may be provided to a person under subsection (a)  
15          for not more than 5 consecutive academic years.

16          “(f) SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCE.—

17                 “(1) IN GENERAL.—A person who receives fi-  
18                 nancial assistance under subsection (a) shall be enti-  
19                 tled to a monthly subsistence allowance at a rate  
20                 prescribed under paragraph (2) for the duration of  
21                 the period for which the person receives such finan-  
22                 cial assistance.

23                 “(2) DETERMINATION OF AMOUNT.—The Sec-  
24                 retary shall prescribe monthly rates for subsistence  
25                 allowance provided under paragraph (1), which shall

1 be equal to the amount specified in section 2144(a)  
2 of title 10, United States Code.

3 “(g) INITIAL CLOTHING ALLOWANCE.—

4 “(1) TRAINING.—The Secretary may prescribe  
5 a sum which shall be credited to each person who re-  
6 ceives financial assistance under subsection (a) to  
7 cover the cost of the person’s initial clothing and  
8 equipment issue.

9 “(2) APPOINTMENT.—Upon completion of the  
10 program of education for which a person receives fi-  
11 nancial assistance under subsection (a) and accept-  
12 ance of appointment in the commissioned officer  
13 corps of the Administration, the person may be  
14 issued a subsequent clothing allowance equivalent to  
15 that normally provided to a newly appointed officer.

16 “(h) TERMINATION OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.—

17 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall termi-  
18 nate the assistance provided to a person under this  
19 section if—

20 “(A) the Secretary accepts a request by  
21 the person to be released from an agreement  
22 described in subsection (b)(2);

23 “(B) the misconduct of the person results  
24 in a failure to complete the period of active  
25 duty required under the agreement; or

1                   “(C) the person fails to fulfill any term or  
2                   condition of the agreement.

3                   “(2) REIMBURSEMENT.—The Secretary may re-  
4                   quire a person who receives assistance described in  
5                   subsection (c), (f), or (g) under an agreement en-

21 “(c) DISMISSAL.—The Secretary may dismiss from  
22 the basic officer training program of the Administration  
23 any officer candidate who, during the officer candidate’s  
24 term as an officer candidate, the Secretary considers un-  
25 satisfactory in either academics or conduct, or not adapted

1 for a career in the commissioned officer corps of the Ad-  
2 ministration. Officer candidates shall be subject to rules  
3 governing discipline prescribed by the Director of the Na-  
4 tional Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Commis-  
5 sioned Officer Corps.

6 “(d) AGREEMENT.—

7 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Each officer candidate  
8 shall sign an agreement with the Secretary in ac-  
9 cordance with section 216(a)(2) regarding the officer  
10 candidate’s term of service in the commissioned offi-  
11 cer corps of the Administration.

12 “(2) ELEMENTS.—An agreement signed by an  
13 officer candidate under paragraph (1) shall provide  
14 that the officer candidate agrees to the following:

15 “(A) That the officer candidate will com-  
16 plete the course of instruction at the basic offi-  
17 cer training program of the Administration.

18 “(B) That upon graduation from the such  
19 program, the officer candidate—

20 “(i) will accept an appointment, if  
21 tendered, as an officer; and

22 “(ii) will serve on active duty for at  
23 least 4 years immediately after such ap-  
24 pointment.

1           “(e) REGULATIONS.—The Secretary shall prescribe  
2 regulations to carry out this section. Such regulations  
3 shall include—

4           “(1) standards for determining what constitutes  
5 a breach of an agreement signed under such sub-  
6 section (d)(1); and

7           “(2) procedures for determining whether such a  
8 breach has occurred.

9           “(f) REPAYMENT.—An officer candidate or former  
10 officer candidate who does not fulfill the terms of the obli-  
11 gation to serve as specified under subsection (d) shall be  
12 subject to the repayment provisions of section 216(b).”.

13           (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents  
14 in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
15 Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as  
16 amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
17 after the item relating to section 233 the following:

“Sec. 234. Officer candidates.”.

18           (c) OFFICER CANDIDATE DEFINED.—Section 212(b)  
19 (33 U.S.C. 3002(b)) is amended by inserting after para-  
20 graph (6) the following:

21           “(7) OFFICER CANDIDATE.—The term ‘officer  
22 candidate’ means an individual who is enrolled in the  
23 basic officer training program of the Administration  
24 and is under consideration for appointment as an of-  
25 ficer under section 221(a)(2)(A).”.

1 (d) PAY FOR OFFICER CANDIDATES.—Section 203 of  
2 title 37, United States Code, is amended by adding at the  
3 end the following:

4 “(f)(1) An officer candidate enrolled in the basic offi-  
5 cer training program of the commissioned officer corps of  
6 the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration is  
7 entitled, while participating in such program, to monthly  
8 officer candidate pay at a monthly rate equal to the basic  
9 pay of an enlisted member in the pay grade E-5 with less  
10 than 2 years service.

11 “(2) An individual who graduates from such program  
12 shall receive credit for the time spent participating in such  
13 program as if such time were time served while on active  
14 duty as a commissioned officer. If the individual does not  
15 graduate from such program, such time shall not be con-  
16 sidered creditable for active duty or pay.”.

17 **SEC. 1794. PROCUREMENT OF PERSONNEL.**

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle B (33 U.S.C. 3021 et  
19 seq.), as amended by section 1793(a) of this subtitle, is  
20 further amended by adding at the end the following:

21 **“SEC. 235. PROCUREMENT OF PERSONNEL.**

22 “The Secretary may take such measures as the Sec-  
23 retary determines necessary in order to obtain recruits for  
24 the commissioned officer corps of the Administration, in-  
25 cluding advertising.”.

1 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents  
2 in section 1 of the Hydrographic Services Improvement  
3 Act Amendments of 2002 (Public Law 107–372), as  
4 amended by this subtitle, is further amended by inserting  
5 after the item relating to section 234 the following:

“235. Procurement of personnel.”.

6 **CHAPTER 4—SEPARATION AND**  
7 **RETIREMENT OF OFFICERS**

8 **SEC. 1795. INVOLUNTARY RETIREMENT OR SEPARATION.**

9 Section 241 (33 U.S.C. 3041) is amended by adding  
10 at the end the following:

11 “(d) DEFERMENT OF RETIREMENT OR SEPARATION  
12 FOR MEDICAL REASONS.—

13 “(1) IN GENERAL.—If the Secretary determines  
14 that the evaluation of the medical condition of an of-  
15 ficer requires hospitalization or medical observation  
16 that cannot be completed with confidence in a man-  
17 ner consistent with the officer’s well being before the  
18 date on which the officer would otherwise be re-  
19 quired to retire or be separated under this section,  
20 the Secretary may defer the retirement or separation  
21 of the officer.

22 “(2) CONSENT REQUIRED.—A deferment may  
23 only be made with the written consent of the officer  
24 involved. If the officer does not provide written con-

1 sent to the deferment, the officer shall be retired or  
2 separated as scheduled.

3 “(3) LIMITATION.—A deferral of retirement or  
4 separation under this subsection may not extend for  
5 more than 30 days after completion of the evalua-  
6 tion requiring hospitalization or medical observa-  
7 tion.”.

8 **SEC. 1796. SEPARATION PAY.**

9 Section 242 (33 U.S.C. 3042) is amended by adding  
10 at the end the following:

11 “(d) EXCEPTION.—An officer discharged for twice  
12 failing selection for promotion to the next higher grade  
13 is not entitled to separation pay under this section if the  
14 officer—

15 “(1) expresses a desire not to be selected for  
16 promotion; or

17 “(2) requests removal from the list of select-  
18 ees.”.
